

REORGANIZATION BILL, HIGHWAY INQUIRY, BEFORE OHIO SOLONS

COLUMBUS, Ohio, March 7.—Three things stand out prominently as legislative tasks for the week when resumption of activity in the Ohio General Assembly is considered.

One is the beginning of the long-delayed Highway Department inquiry which, thus far, has been an affair of star chamber sessions.

There are to be hearings on the reorganization bill submitted by Governor Harry L. Davis to the General Assembly.

Davis Measure Opposed.

It has developed that numerous friends of the administration wish him to drop the matter entirely as being the product of persons alien to Ohio and possessing little knowledge as to what the Buckeye state public desires. The Governor's opponents, as late as Saturday, did not think that any true would be reached between the factions. They gave out information that at the proper time they would make public the figures as to the cost of the additional bureau and department chiefs that will be added to the public payroll by reason of the reorganization proposal.

They also stated that in Illinois, which is taken for a model, the actual expenses had increased \$11,000,000 in a year of the state government under the reorganization plan, and that the voters of the state were for from satisfied with it.

The per capita expenses increased far more than in Ohio and other states have not experienced change in state government, it was stated.

Of greatest importance of propositions to be taken up this week is the taxation issue. The Citizens' Committee named by Governor Davis is expected to give final approval to the compromise plan, contemplating real estate, income, inheritance and franchise taxes.

The forces that still uphold the uniform rule contend that they have been gaining in sentiment, notwithstanding the agreement of the committee.

It is understood to be their purpose

to present to the General Assembly other measures for enactment, probably including a state income tax superimposed upon citizens' present taxes. The Citizens' Committee may report findings upon the work in which it has been engaged.

A great amount of material has been gathered. One of the points it has established is that the "tax-spenders," so-called, have not caused the major

portion of the public debt, which now exceeds half a billion dollars.

It was voted upon the taxing districts largely by the voters themselves, but often by a minority of those who actually went to the polls and almost always by a pitifully small minority in contrast to the aggregate number of voters.
