

FREE THREE-DAY COOKING DEMONSTRATIONS BEGIN WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON AT COLISEUM

Arrangements for a free cooking school demonstration for the housewives of the city, to be held in the Coliseum on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday afternoons of this week under the auspices of the Palladium, are being completed. The school will open at 2 o'clock each afternoon and will be in session until 4:30 o'clock.

Three women demonstrators, the Misses Maizie Boyd and Asenith Denchie, and Mrs. Margaret Brown, all of the Indiana headquarters of the Corn Products Refining company, have been secured to carry on the work. These women will have entire charge of the cooking and will explain the advantages of their methods as they conduct the demonstration.

"All Richmond" Affair.

According to present plans the demonstration is to be as near an "all Richmond" affair as it is possible to make. Materials for the cooking are to be furnished by various Richmond firms. Even the utensils and apparatus used for the cooking will be loaned by firms dealing in the equipment.

Cakes and pies "like mother used to make" will be there in ample measure if plans now under way are carried out. Indeed, it is believed that this demonstration will "pan out" some entirely unique specimens of the cul-

inary art for the benefit of Richmond housewives.

The Home Garden

Only those crops that can be used in the home or sold in the neighborhood should be grown in the home garden. All seeds should be selected early and obtained from a reliable dealer. The garden should be planted with the best seed that can be obtained. The characteristics of seeds and plants can be learned from seed catalogues. Most, if not all those commonly used can be obtained from local dealers. The following named varieties of the common vegetables are satisfactory for most home gardens.

Beans, string or bush: Green-podded—Bountiful, Stringless, Refugee, Wax-podded—Wardwell's Kidney, British Wax.

Beets: Crosby's Egyptian, Early Egyptian.

Cabbage: Early—Early Jersey Wakefield, Charleston Large Wakefield, Medium—Early Summer, Copenhagen Market, Late—Danish Ball-head, Autumn King.

Carrot: Early—Earliest Short Horn, Late—Chantenay, Improved Rubicon.

Celeri: Early—White Plume, Late—Boston Market.

Corn, sweet: Early—Golden Bantam, Adam's Early, Late—White Mexican, Country Gentleman.

Cucumber: White Spine, Emerald.

Lettuce: Loose-leaf—Grand Rapids, Black seeded Simpson, Cabbage-head—Wayhead, Big Boston, Crisp-head—Iceberg.

Onion: Danvers, Southport White Globe.

Peas: Early round—Alaska, Early wrinkled—Sutton's Excelsior, Mid-season—Thomas Laxton, Alderman, Late—Potlach, Champion of England.

Pepper: Sweet—Pimiento, Baby Bell Hot—Red Chili, Tabasco.

Radish: Round—White-tipped Scarlet, Early Scarlet Globe, Oval—French Breakfast, Early Scarlet Oval.
