

STAGE ALL SET; COLISEUM COOKING SCHOOL OPENS THREE DAY SESSION

With all arrangements complete for the first of the three day series of cooking demonstrations to be held Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week, the Coliseum Wednesday afternoon presented a scene of varied activity. The stage setting particularly, was impressive with the black, oil ranges, white cabinets, and other appliances peculiar to the kitchen stood near at hand.

Three figures, clad in immaculate white aprons, bustled about, putting in the finishing touches. The stoves, carefully adjusted during the morning hours, were now ready for business and indications were that the opening day of the Palladium cooking school would go off without a hitch of any kind.

Richmond merchants and Richmond equipment in the showing of kitchen equipment arranged for the demonstration. An important feature of the show was the fact that practically every bit of the material or equipment in use was contributed by local merchants.

As planned for the afternoon, the

exhibit was to include the baking of a few samples of the culinary art with a lecture to show the advantages of using certain equipment and an explanation of the value of the products used.

Ranges set up early in the day, had to be adjusted, and the three demonstrators secured for the occasion, had to unpack their huge trunks in which lurked numberless instruments designed to minister to the needs of these experts.

Down on the main floor, seats had been arranged to insure that housewives, waiting for the outcome of the operations going on before them, might not grow weary. The program was scheduled to open at 2 o'clock, continuing until 4:30 p. m.

There was only one feature of the affair which "lacked man" was in his element. Each demonstration closes with the serving of samples of the work that has been done during the afternoon. What with that and the music that has been provided, the Coliseum bade fair to become as much of a men's gathering as for women.
