

### INDIAN SINGER WHO APPEARED HERE NOW IN NEW YORK OPERA

Chief Caupolican, a native Arakanian Indian, of the Chilean Andes, who sang at the Richmond chautauqua and appeared before the Rotary club, made his debut with the Metropolitan Opera company, of New York, in the leading role of "The Polish Jew," last night.

A New York dispatch says the following about the Indian singer, whose ability was favorably commented on when he sang here:

"Every seat in the auditorium, from the starched shirts section to music lover's roost, had been taken many days in advance, and with one accord they gave to the 'big chief' a rousing reception."

**Two Races Blend.**  
The steterian voice of his Indian father and the musical appreciation of his French mother have been blended into an operatic barytone of rare richness, personified in the Indian chief, said to be the first of his race ever to have come to this pinnacle of voice development.

"Chief Caupolican's grandfather was the chief conductor of the jangling orchestra of primeval Indian instruments in the foothills of the Chilean mountains. At that time, according to custom, his son—Caupolican's father—was adopted by a French family of immigrants, and was taught the ways and customs of the white man."

"When he attained manhood, he fell in love with the daughter of the French family, and they were married, the Indian promising to forsake the traditions of the tribe."

**Tribe Asks Return.**  
"After a son—Caupolican—was born, however, the old chieftain died. The tribe mourned, and would not be comforted until the only son—Caupolican's father—promised to be their chief and leader, finally reversing his promise to his French wife, he consented."

"The mother, however, took the son Caupolican, back to southern France, where his vocal ability was developed, and later he visited his father's tribesmen in Chile. He afterwards became a sailor, saving enough money to come to New York to study."

He was "discovered" here by a member of the Metropolitan Opera company."

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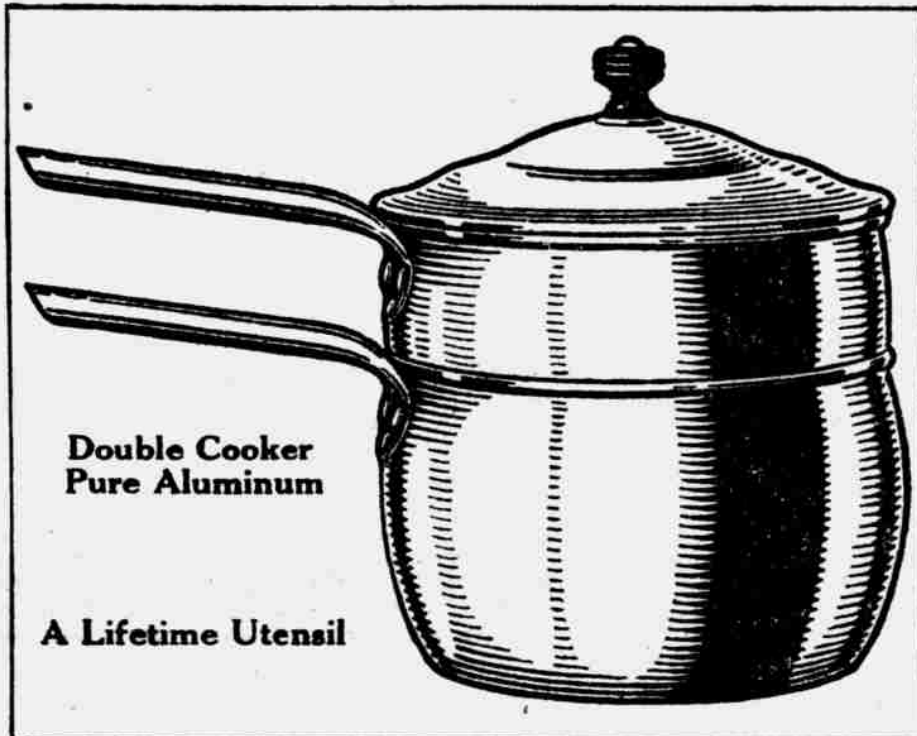
