

SEE DANGER IN LAWS PASSED BY ASSEMBLY; WOULD CURB EFFECT

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 22.—Efforts to curb the effect of "salary grab" laws and prevent the bankruptcy of several counties in the state are being made by the state board of accounts. Three so-called "salary grab" laws passed by the recent legislature have possibilities of bankrupting any county in the state, officials declare. These "innocent little bills," it is said, were slipped through the legislature without the real effect becoming known at the time of their passage.

The three new laws in which some officials see danger are the deputy sheriff law, the court bailiff law and the county school superintendent salary law. The deputy sheriff law provides for the employment and payment of deputy sheriffs by the county commissioners on the recommendation of the sheriff. The court bailiff law provides for the appointment of bailiffs at a salary fixed by the judge. The school head law provides that the board of education, with approval of county commissioners, shall fix the salary of the county superintendent at not less than \$1,500 a year, but provides no maximum.

Allege Sky Limit.
Under these laws, according to officials, "the sky is the limit." It is pointed out that under the deputy sheriff law there is nothing to prevent the wholesale employment of deputies and under the school law a salary of any amount may be fixed for the superintendent. The court law, it is pointed out, opens the way for the employment of a full-time bailiff, who will continue to draw pay even when the court is not in session.

The state board of accounts made a ruling to the effect that the employment of deputy sheriffs under the law should be made only in cases of emergency and that the regular salary of the sheriff is not to come under the provisions of the law. In the case of the bailiff law the board made a recommendation that a salary of \$5 a day while working be regarded as a maximum.

In both cases the rulings were made at the request of officials who wished to take advantage of the laws, after setting forth the views of the department in regard to the laws are being prepared and will be sent to officials at once. The question of fixing county school superintendent's salaries has not yet been brought to the attention of officials.




