

COUNCIL VOTES TO ENFORCE ORDINANCE ON PARKING AUTOS

"Who will try the mayor?" is a question to come up shortly according to statements in council meeting Monday evening and the judging by the determined attitude of the council as manifested in the passing of a resolution to enforce the north and south street parking ordinance recently passed.

A large share of the council meeting was taken up with a discussion of the enforcement of the ordinance. The discussion started with the introduction of a resolution to enforce the ordinance. Standing on statements made on several past occasions, Mayor Zimmerman said that he would continue to park his car on the west side of the street, in front of his residence, ordinance or no ordinance.

The law provides that all violations of city ordinances must be tried in the city court. As the mayor would preside over this court ordinarily, his exact status is in doubt. City Attorney Reiler when asked about the matter Monday evening, said he would cross that bridge when he came to it.

A wordy battle between Councilman Ford and the mayor occurred when the former spoke in behalf of the enforcement resolution. He said "Any man who is a good citizen, and wants to comply with the law ought to have civic pride enough to enforce the law even if it does compel him to cross the street to reach his car."

"I expect that man is just as good a citizen, and tax payer, and had his tax receipts in as good shape before and after he took office as the man who just left the floor," said the Mayor.

Will Try It Out.

"We will try this ordinance out in the court," he said a moment later following is putting of the question and passing of the resolution.

An ordinance for the dissemination of Fair and Height was passed to the third reading. A letter of explanation from the city engineer was read. The letter was sent to J. E. Thatcher from Charlie Jordan.

In response to complaints from residents of that vicinity made by Councilman Snyder, the police department was instructed to take up with the railroad company the condition of the viaducts on Sheridan and West Second streets.

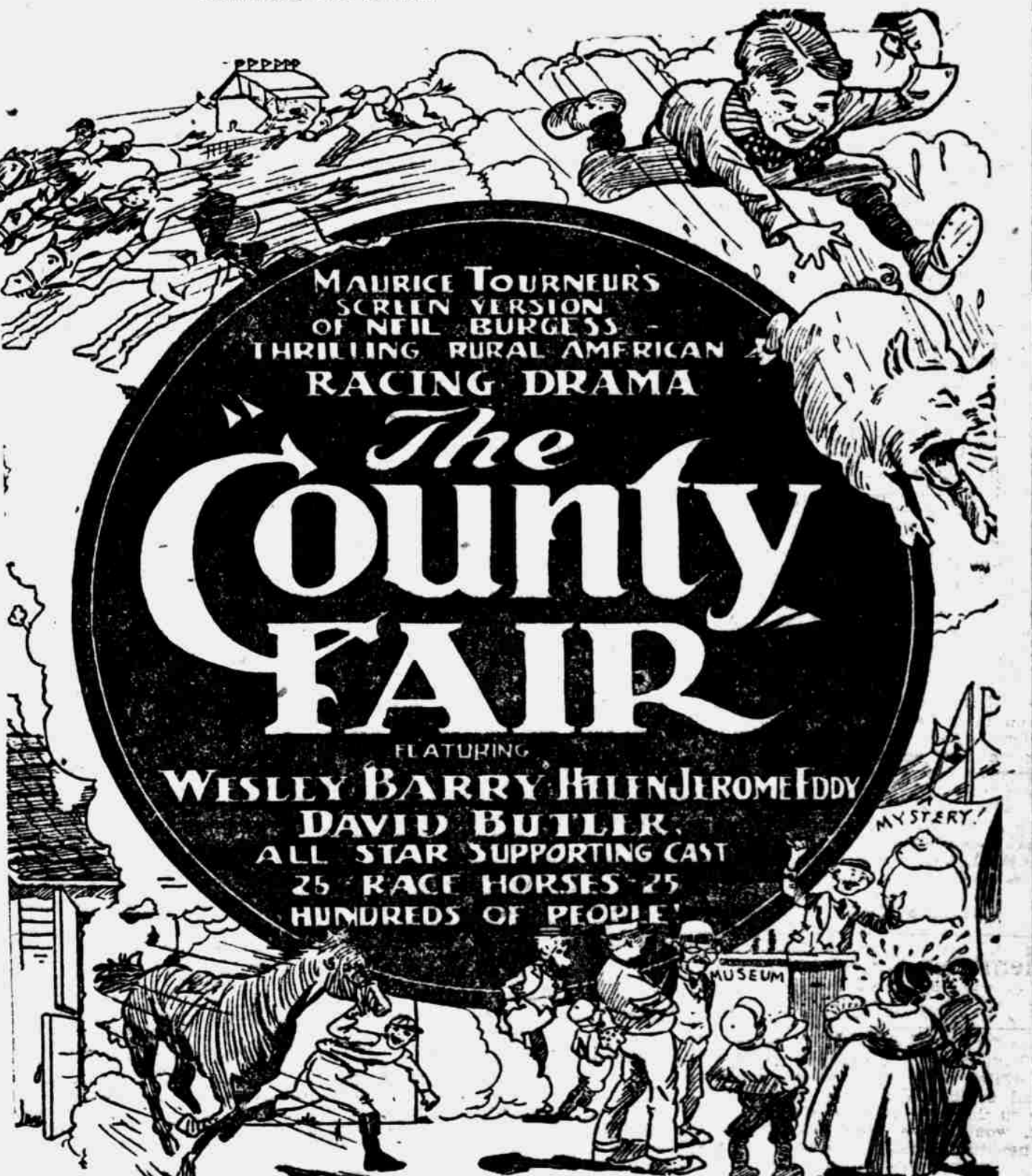
