

RICHMOND STUDENTS BUILD BIRD HOUSES; INVITED TO EXHIBIT

Students in the lower grades of the local schools this year probably will continue the work in bird house building that has been given here for the past seven or eight years, a local instructor said Thursday.

The material used in construction here is very light and suitable for handling by children. Boxes are made and mounted, or placed in trees by the classes, usually about this time of year.

Students and teachers of the Richmond schools have been invited to visit room 109 in the statehouse at Indianapolis, where a number of sample shelter, nesting and feeding houses are exhibited.

Insectivorous birds of economic value to mankind by reason of their feeding on depredating insects are going to be housed in rustic houses according to plans of the state department of conservation which is co-operating with the state Audubon society to interest Hoosiers in bird conservation.

A reference library and colored charts of birds native to Indiana, as well as those which migrate here in summer will be maintained in the Indianapolis exhibit, and literature will be distributed telling how to construct bird houses economically.

The exhibit consists of rustic houses of only one room and built at negligible cost to veritable palaces de luxe—genius of the carpenter's art. One elaborate three-story frame for Martins has 30 suites of "parlor, bedroom and bath" and is named the Waldorf-Astoria. It has copper roof, spacious verandas and individual porches. Old Glory proudly floats from a staff mounted on the roof.

Winter shelter and feeding houses have glass enclosed compartments protecting occupants from icy blasts. Scraps from the table may be scattered on feeding boards. Hooks hold meat strips essential for winter feeding. One feature of the exhibit is an apparatus to fit around tree trunks to prevent cats and squirrels from climbing to the bird houses in the branches above.
