

ASKS SCHOOL HEADS TO DEFER CHOICE OF ATTENDANCE OFFICER

Notice has been sent to local school officials by L. N. Hines, states superintendent of public instruction asking that the election of attendance officers, scheduled for May 2, under the provisions of the present law, be deferred until the new statute governing the office becomes effective. The notice was sent out at the request of Governor McCray. The appointment and duties of the office were changed considerably by a law passed by the recent sessions of the general assembly.

"On recommendation of the governor," said Mr. Hines, "I am writing you relative to the matter of appointing an attendance officer. The acts of 1915, page 151, provide for the election of an attendance officer May 1 of each year, or the Monday following if May 1 comes on Sunday. House bill No. 274, by implication, repeals the principal provisions of the compulsory school attendance law now in force, including that part relating to the election of attendance officers."

"The new law probably will become effective between May 1 and May 15. This law places new responsibilities upon the attendance officers and provides for a greater number of them. It also provides for traveling expenses and an increase in salary. Furthermore, it provides that no person shall be appointed to this position who has not completed the work in the elementary public schools and is not qualified in the manner and in accordance with the standards and regulations determined by the state board of attendance. According to the new law the persons appointed shall take office Aug. 1."

"In view of the provisions of this law, and the importance attaching thereto, it is recommended that the matter of appointing attendance officers be deferred until the new law becomes effective, and the state board of attendance has an opportunity to meet, formulate and publish instructions regarding this important statute. "In the event the county board of education should meet Monday, May 2, select an attendance officer, it is further recommended that they adjourn without making a selection to meet at the call of the county superintendent—the call to be made upon the recommendations of the state board of attendance."

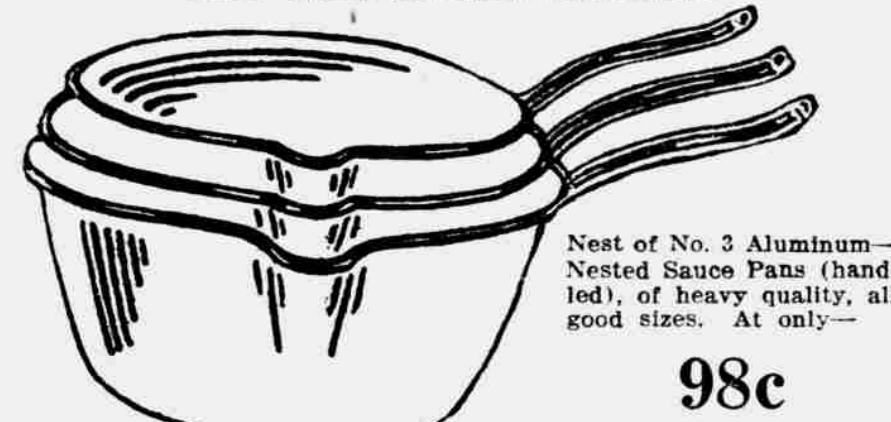
