

## MANY NEW MEASURES PROPOSED AS OHIO ASSEMBLY NEARS END

COLUMBUS, O., April 1.—In this calendar day, supposed to mark the approach of the end of the sessions of the Ohio general assembly, more than two dozen new bills, many of them proposing radical changes in legal principles, were proposed.

It was near 2 o'clock Thursday morning before the house of representatives recessed "for five minutes," after adopting a resolution asking the senate for formal leave to quit until April 18. This was granted grudgingly this afternoon and the handful of members present in the house then left for their homes.

The senate remained in session during the afternoon and night, planning a short session Friday. It will continue through next week, and possibly part of the following week before it departs until April 18.

At the conclusion of hearings on the Davis reorganization "ripper" the senate reorganization committee planned to go over amendments providing for a test between Governor Harry L. Davis and the senate, backed by the public utility interests and the manufacturers.

**Delay Is Expected.**  
Majority Leader F. E. Whittemore said he doubted that it would be reported before next week. The indications are that the bill, with or without the "emergency clause" suspending the referendum, will not reach the governor before May 1.

This delay is made certain for purpose by the governor's factional enemies, it is agreed by the onlookers in order to make the "immediate necessity" as ridiculous as possible when the case goes to the Ohio supreme court. Substantially two months will have gone by from the introduction of the bill until it can be filed in the office of the secretary of state.

On taxation, not a move was made by either side. The victorious rule defenders of the uniform rule condemned what "Major General" John Chester, of Paulding county, the state leader, called a "council of war." Professors of compromise by the advocates of change were not considered seriously and the hand places its on record as being "opposed to classification" and for anything to "bring out hidden property and make everyone pay his share of taxes."

As the modified Davis amendment was submitted to the house last Thursday night as a substitute for the Silver resolution, as amended by Representative C. H. Fouts, of Morgan county, the uniform rule forces compelled it to be printed with the Fouts amendment, as well as without. It said they would surrender no principle.

## WILL "NEW CONFERENCE OF VERSAILLES" FOLLOW ARRIVAL OF VIVIANI IN U. S.?

The recent arrival in the U. S. of Rene Viviani, former premier of France, has given rise to the belief that a new "conference of Versailles" will sit in Washington in the near future and attempt to straighten out the peace situation. Viviani comes as envoy extraordinary officially to convey the good wishes of the French government to President Harding, but it is believed that he will meet with the president, Secretary of State Hughes, members of the senate foreign relations committee and other American leaders in an attempt to work out President Harding's ideas of an association of nations and discuss European problems that vitally affect America.

## To Free Cambridge Man After 60 Day Sentence

J. J. Richardson, Cambridge City man, who was sentenced to the penal farm by Mayor Elliott at Newcastle for violation of the liquor laws, will gain his freedom after serving the 60 days' sentence at the penal farm. Richardson was fined \$100 and costs, totaling \$130, and local authorities believed he would have to serve a total of 190 days for want of money to pay the fine. His wife, however, has paid the \$130 and a letter was then sent to

the penal farm officials instructing them to release the man after the expiration of his 60 days' sentence.

## Indiana Brevities

**GARY.**—A 17-year search for a sister from whom he had been separated since she was two years old, ended Thursday when William Burns, of this city received a letter from Lillian Burns, the sister, now 19 years old. Miss Burns was located in Parma,

Idaho, through the assistance of the Red Cross. A younger brother Carl, was also at the same place.

**GOSHEN.**—Vernon Unzicker, 21 years old, of this city, employed as Chicago, South Bend and Northern Indiana Traction ticket agent at the local passenger station, is in jail here, charged with robbing cash fare boxes on city cars operated by the company. Unzicker, police say, admitted he stole \$300, but traction officials declare about \$1,200 is missing.

**BRAZIL.**—Albert Beaman, 40 years old, was smothered to death in a cave-

in of a ditch which he was digging in his yard. Beaman was working at the bottom of an eight foot ditch when the sides caved in. Frantic efforts to dig the man out alive were made without avail.

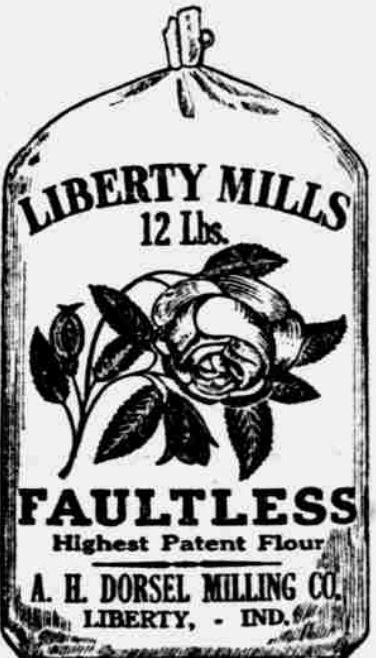
