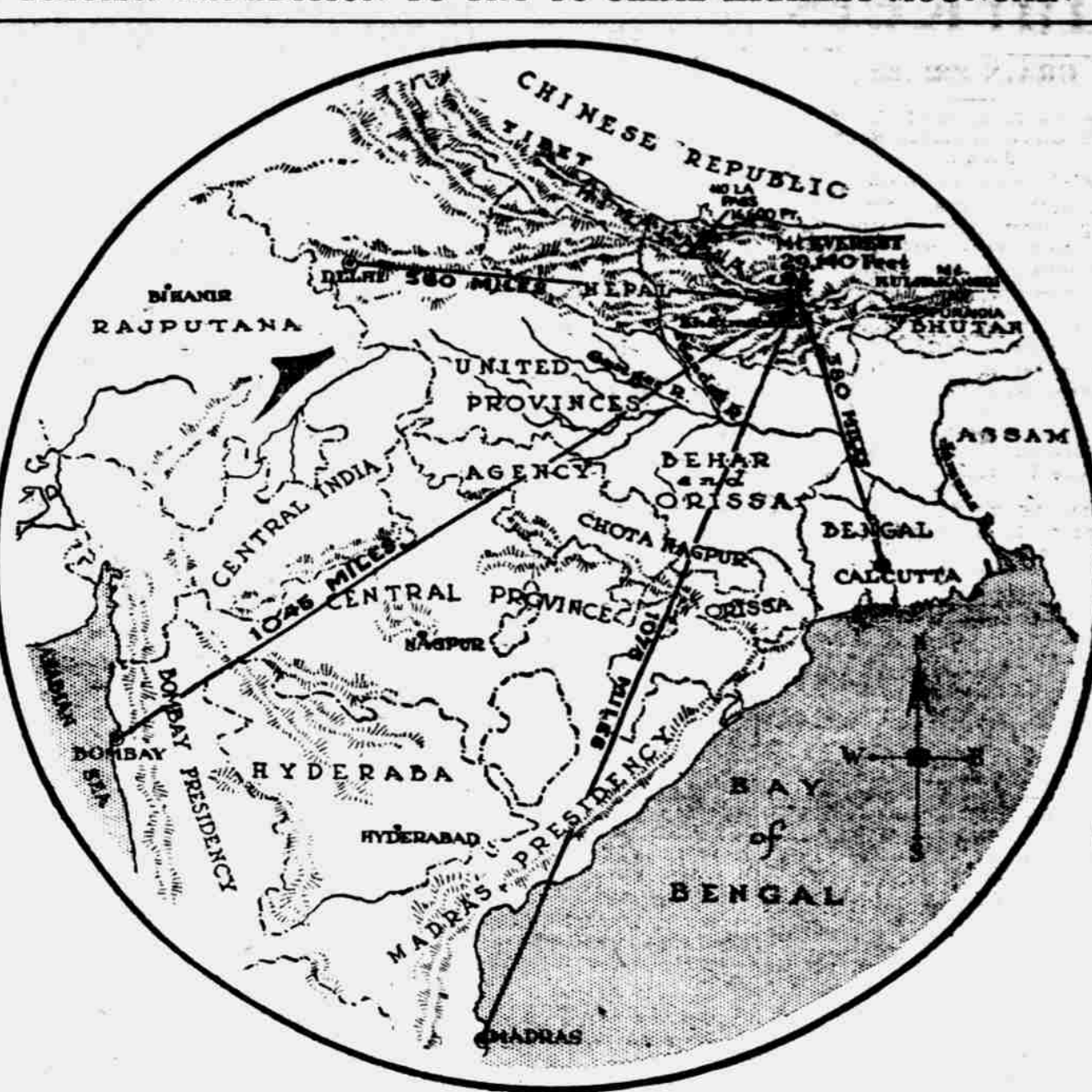

Glen Miller Receipts
Drop; Break in Price
Causes Holding Sentiment

With the severe break in prices, less than \$3,000 worth of stock was received at the Glen Miller Stock yards Saturday. Jerome Shurley issues the following statement regarding conditions at the local market and nearby selling points.

"With receipts of hogs at all markets larger than requirements during the week, prices descended to a new low level, good light hogs, from 160 to 150 pounds, selling at 9 1/2 cents, 250 pound hogs and heavier at 8 cents; sows, five to seven cents as to quality; stags, four to five cents.

Plain Cattle Inactive.
"With a loss of \$1 per hundred in the price of cattle, it is impossible to buy plain cattle cheap enough in the country to get them to market. We quote good fat steers \$7 to \$8; heifers, \$5 to \$6; cows, \$1.50 to \$5; bulls, \$4 to \$5. The veal calf market is demoralized, being \$3 a hundred lower than two weeks ago, top, \$5; common and large, \$4 to \$5.

With good weather so farmers can get at spring work, we look for light receipts and at least a steady market. Farmers are inclined to hold, thinking the market may react later. The prices for stock hogs is at a standstill due to the break in price of fat hogs. Feeders who bought out of line with the present market are beginning to think they bought too soon."

Of the passenger automobiles produced in this country for 1921, the present style list shows 56 four-cylinder, 85 six-cylinder, 14 eight-cylinder and three 12-cylinder cars.

Protests are Part of Program.
Protests to the state department at Washington over the taking over of land by the American government for canal defense purposes was the first step in the independence program. The Panama administration asserted that the occupation of territory under the Hay-Varela treaty should be consummated through the regular diplomatic channels and that, if the United States government continued its present policy to its logical conclusion, it could swallow the entire republic without pausing to notify the victim.

These protests, aimed at the utilization of points on Taboga Island, on the Pacific side, and on the Bahía de las Minas, on the Caribbean shore, were almost simultaneous with a protest against a written opinion by Judge John W. Hanan of the United States district court of the Canal Zone, in which the court stated Panama occupied the position of a protectorate of the United States. President Porras declared that he counted upon the support of Latin-American republics in this protest.

The next incident upon which the Porras administration took a decided stand for a free hand in running the republic came during the last week in

Panama National Spirit is Seen in Boundary Clash With Costa Rica

(By Associated Press)
PANAMA, April 4.—The hostilities with Costa Rica over disputed border territory, which began last month and evoked an admonition from the United States government, broke just at the right moment for the administration of President Belisario Porras to attempt to utilize them in its campaign to assure the isthmian republic the right to conduct its affairs without foreign interference.

A national spirit has been developing in Panama since November 3, 1903, when for the fifth and last time, Panama declared her independence. It was hardly perceptible during the first decade of the republic's existence, but, in his New Year's message of January 1, 1921, President Porras gave utterance to the belief of his administration that the time was ripe for Panama to stand alone.

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February, when the President, in an interview given The Associated Press, announced that he had decided to name a Panamanian to succeed Addison T. Ryan, American, as fiscal agent. During the incumbency of Mr. Ryan the republic had piled up a surplus of \$2,500,000, which the administration intended to utilize in an extensive road building program. In this connection the president said:

President Makes Statement
Jennings Price, is opposed to the appointment of a Panamanian citizen, claiming we must appoint a candidate selected by the American government. This question seems to be connected with the termination of the contract with the International Banking Corporation as depository of the government's funds and treasury receipts which I have decided not to renew because we have a national bank managed today by a very efficient manager and which is in a prosperous condition."

Immediately after this interview it was announced that the government had awarded road building contracts to two companies, one North American and the other Panamanian, in a program involving the expenditure of about \$7,000,000.

Even while the president and the American minister were conferring over the affair of the fiscal agent, Costa Rican forces, on February 21, occupied the small town of Coto, on Golfo Dulce, the most extreme Pacific side frontier of Panama. Without following the 18-year old custom of advising the United States authorities, the president dispatched a force of national police from Panama to dislodge the alien army.

Administration Change. Factor
In official American quarters here it was noted that Panama's determination to live her own life manifested itself at a time when the national administration at Washington was changing and that it was marked by the failure to advise American representatives of the steps taken to preserve Panama's territorial integrity, even though the United States guaranteed this integrity in the canal treaty.

Despite efforts to keep the expedition secret, the American authorities learned of the movements of the two Central American governments promptly and in advance of most of the residents of Panama.

The prompt dispatch of American warships to Bocas del Toro and the note sent to Panama and Costa Rica by Secretary of State Hughes on March 6, calling a halt in the hostilities came as a shock to plans of the Panama administration to settle the dispute over Costa Rica single-handed.

The situation in Panama prior to the retirement of the Costa Rican forces from the territory they had seized was in many respects similar to that prevailing in Mexico before the fall of Carranza, where the government sought to hold public support by posing as the defender of Mexico's rights against North American aggression.

Charge Cambridge Man With Petit Larceny
Reece Carlin, of Milton, was arrested at Cambridge City Monday morning by Marshall Dick Summers, charged with petit larceny. He was brought to Richmond and lodged in the county jail. Carlin is said to be an old offender and has a sentence hanging over him, having escaped from local officials some time ago.

Carlin is said to have stolen a pair of trousers and a cap from a store in Cambridge City. These were found on his possession, local officials stated.
