### APPEAL TO RELIEF IN LAUNCHING DRIVE TO RELIEVE STARVING

Relief for the starving and suffering of China and Armenia is the plea of the Wayne county relief committee, which opened its county campaign for funds, Monday morning. The drive is to continue for two weeks. Contributions should be mailed or taken to the Chamber of Commerce headquarters in the K. of P. building.

To the appeal that was made last year, there has been added that of China. Action is necessary at once to save lives, according to Mrs. A. W. Roach, county chairman of the two relief drives. Reports on conditions in Armenia read:

"The end of the war found the remnants of the Armenian people herded in refugee camps—crowded underground in cities—struggling along highways—robbed, homeless and destitute. A portion of them found refuge in the Russian Caucasus, where, during the Russian Revolution was formed the small republic of Armenia which held the allied line against Turkish advance. By far, the larger number of Armenians, however, fled, or were exiled in the opposite direction—southwest in Cilicia, Northern Syria and the deserts of northern Mesopotamia.

Render Relief.  
"Wherever in the Near East there are destitute Armenians, Syrians,

Greeks, Jews, Assyrians, or others, needy and oppressed, regardless of race or creed, relief is being rendered.

Many forms of contribution hitherto much is provided by the two relief organizations. Every person that can afford to give any amount of money is urged to do so at once. Printed in this issue is a blank which may be filled out and mailed to the Near East and China Relief committee, in care of the Chamber of Commerce. All checks are to be made payable to Charles W. Jordan, treasurer of the Wayne county committee.

No solicitation is to be made, other than the sending of letters to persons who contributed to the Armenia fund last year.

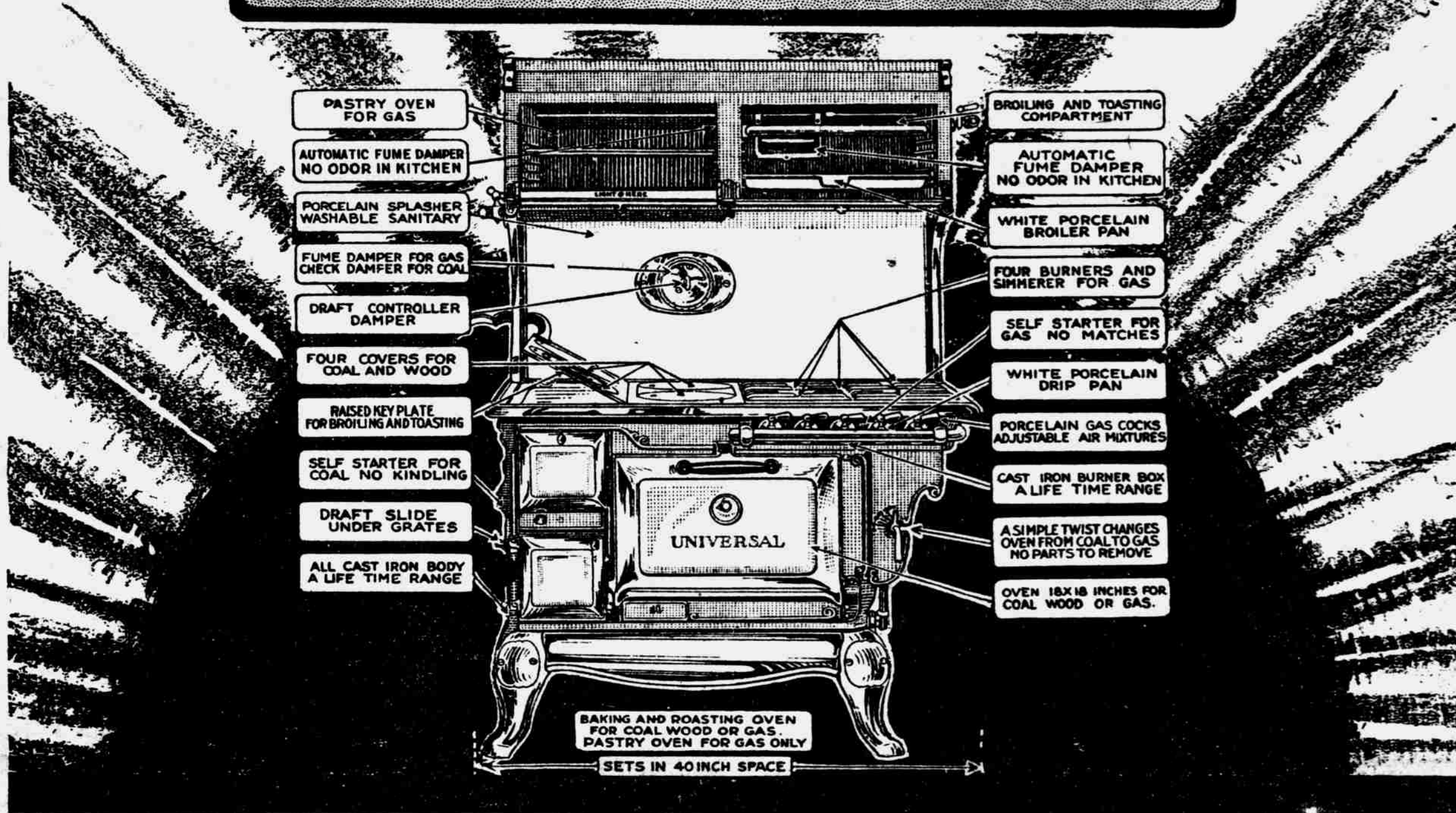

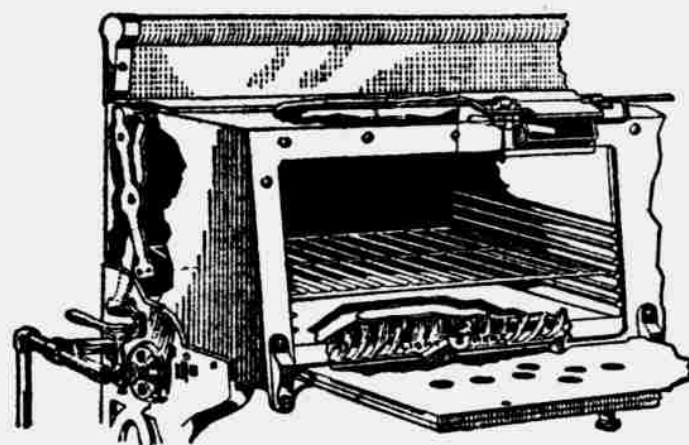

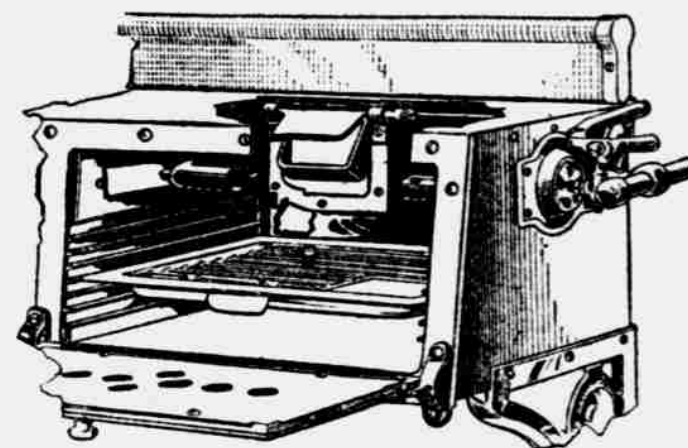
