

INDIANAPOLIS WILL ENTERTAIN KNIGHTS TEMPLAR OF INDIANA

Intensive preparations are being concluded by Raper commandery and the various committees to make a success in the entertainment of the visitors from the Knights Templar commanderies of other cities of Indiana, when the Grand commandery of Indiana holds its sixty-seventh annual convocation in Indianapolis on May 11 and 12. Headquarters will be located at the Masonic Temple, North Illinois and West North streets.

Grand Commander Harry C. Moore of Marion, and William H. Swintz, Grand Recorder, Indianapolis, are doing much to bring about the success and popularity of the Knights Templar order and the enthusiasm of its members. They wisely hold to the belief that the wives and families of the members are entitled to participate in its pleasures.

A special program for the entertainment of the ladies attending the Grand Convocation, during their two days' stay in Indianapolis, is being worked out by the forgoing committee. The wives of all Knights coming to Indianapolis will be provided with seats in the grand stand.

State is Divided.
Indiana has been divided into three zones for competition for one of the three attendance trophies, based on the distance of each Commandery from Indianapolis. A prize will be awarded to the Commandery in each zone that shows the highest percentage according to the following: Number of own members actually in line

in the parade when passing the reviewing stand; number of own members present as Grand or Past Grand officers; number of own members present who are physical unable to march. The foregoing will be certified by the Eminent Commander, Generalissimo and captain-general of each Commandery and each of these officers is to make his own count. The trophies will be awarded at the Grand Commandery session on Thursday morning, May 12. Zones are based on distance from Indianapolis:

Zone 1, 60 miles or less, includes Baldwin No. 2 of Shelbyville, Connersville No. 6, Knightstown No. 9, Green castle No. 11, Columbus No. 14, Tuncel No. 18, Franklin No. 23, Crawfordsville No. 25, Frankfort No. 29, Anderson No. 32, Kokomo No. 36, Greenfield No. 39, Lebanon No. 43, Newcastle No. 44, Brazil No. 47, Rushville No. 49, Tipton No. 52, Martinsville No. 55, Seymour No. 56, Greensburg No. 59, Raper No. 1 Indianapolis, does not participate.

Richmond in Second Zone.
Zone 2, from 60 to 100 miles, includes Lafayette No. 3, Richmond No. 8, Terre Haute No. 16, Marion No. 21, Madison No. 22, St. John No. 24, of Logansport, Wabash No. 37, Bluffton No. 38, Delphi No. 40, Clinton No. 48, Winchester No. 53, Sullivan No. 54, Bedford No. 42, Peru U. D.

Zone 3, more than 100 miles, includes Ft. Wayne No. 4, New Albany No. 5, Warsaw No. 10, Laporte No. 12, South Bend No. 13, LaValette No. 15 of Evansville, Vincennes No. 19 of Kendallville, Jeffersonville No. 27 Valparaiso No. 28, Michigan City No. 30 Elkhart No. 31, Washington No. 33, Cyrene No. 34 of Columbia City, Huntington No. 35, Hammond No. 41, Angola No. 45, Princeton No. 46, Mishawaka No. 51, Gary No. 57, East Chicago No. 58.

occasion, both on their pilgrimage to and from Indianapolis.

Called by Death

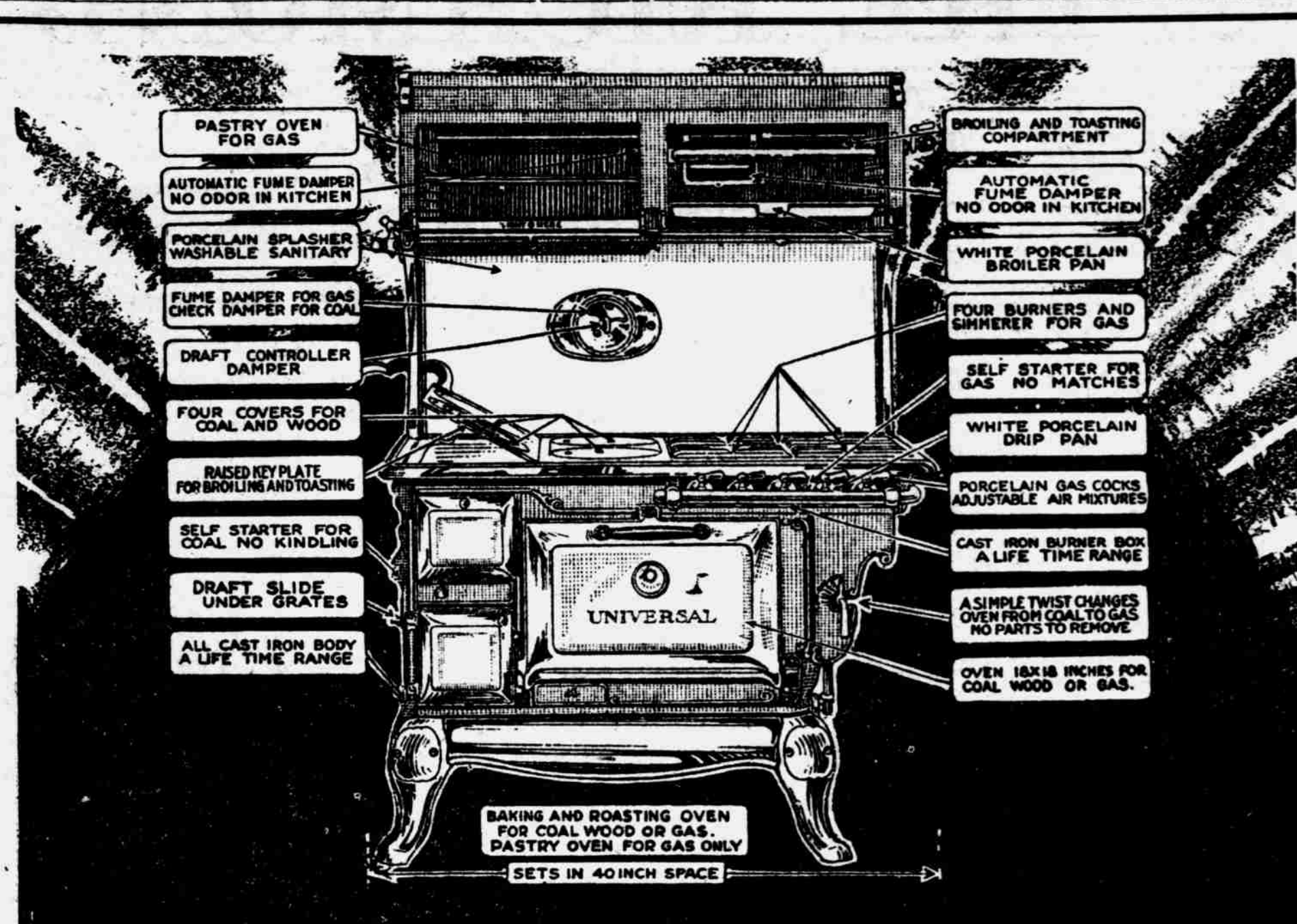

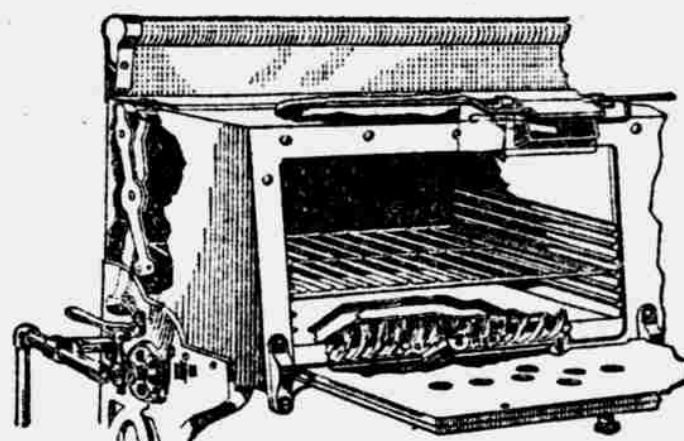

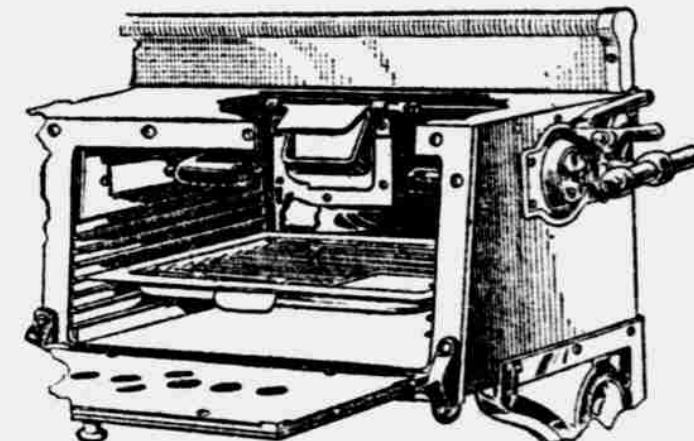
