Beauty Chats

YOUTHFUL NAILS.

Youthful nails help keep the hand young looking, and a young looking hand has much to do with the youthfulness of your appearance. You can not seem to be in your twenties, even with a wonderful face, if your hands are thin and the nails ragged and full of ridges.

In a way, the same rule that applies to keeping the hair young and the face and figure young, applies to keep-

ing the nails smooth. This is by means of nourishment and stimulation. You would soon die if you did not nourish your body, even if you used up no energy. Yet many women go year after year, taking energy out of the nails, and giving them nothing. I mean, they let the nails soak in hot water, fill them with strong, drying soap, change them from hot to cold by plunging them from hot water into cold water—and never think that they are absorbing the natural oils that nourish the nails, that they are literally starving them into premature old age.

Feed the nails oils, vegetable oils that they will absorb. Keep them as nice as possible by clearing away dead cuticle and by keeping them filed so they will not break.

And buff them, every day. This alone will do more than anything else to stimulate them, since the friction of the buffer will bring up the blood to the nails and under the nails, and will keep them pretty and pink. Buffing alone will not do away with ridges in every case, neither will constant massage and oil treatment. But these things help amazingly, as I know from personal experience. And in some cases, such treatments will do away with ridges.

Mrs. Rose K.—Your bust will probably recover as you build yourself up. A great help will come from practicing deep breathing. This will invigorate your whole body and will also tone up all the muscles that support the bust. Another help will be the toning up, which results from dashing cold water over the chest each morning followed by a brisk rubbing with a coarse bath towel.

Brown Eyes—You can reduce the lips by exercises. Stand with weight

on ball of foot, hands at waist, keep face to the front; inhale as body is brought to position. Repeat six to ten times with each side and close with hands on hips; lower the upper body from the waist, completely relax and move it in a circle around the body.
