

REID MEMORIAL WILL OBSERVE NATIONAL HOSPITAL DAY IN MAY

Reid Memorial hospital will observe National Hospital Day, May 12. Surgeon General Hugh S. Cumming of the United States Public Health Service, following the endorsement of the day by President Harding has instructed the commanding officer of each of the sixty-seven government hospitals in which the 26,000 disabled war veterans are under treatment, to throw wide the doors on May 12 and invite the public to talk with the patients, inspect the food, laundry and other departments and to otherwise learn how the service men are being cared for.

Memor Florence Nightingale May 12 was chosen as the day for the observance as it is the anniversary of the birth of Florence Nightingale, pioneer in modern hospital and nursing methods. Although the idea of a National Hospital Day was originated by Chicago hospital people a little more than a month ago, it already has been heartily endorsed by governors and other public officials and leaders in welfare work in all parts of the United States and Canada.

COLD CREAMS.
If you have a dry skin, or if you are approaching the age when wrinkles are a little too prominent, or if you live in a very hot, dry climate you will need a nourishing cold cream. You had better make this yourself, since most creams on the market are made with mineral oil, which is much cheaper. An excellent general formula is:

FINE COLD CREAM
Rose water 4 ounces
Almond oil 4 ounces
Spermaceti 1 ounce
White wax 1 ounce
Benzoin 1 drachm

To make this, put the white wax and spermaceti with the oil and heat until all are melted together. Take from the fire at once, add the rose water and benzoin, which should be warm, and beat as they cool.

Bright Eyes.—You can add to your weight by taking a tablespoonful of olive oil, with the same quantity of grape juice. This may be taken with each meal or three times each day.
