C. Calhoun, of Washington, the foundation president. Miss Alice Carpenter, the foundation's secretary, said a 10-acre estate at the head of Connecticut avenue in Washington has been acquired, where it is proposed to construct a group of artistic buildings and clubhouses, one residence for each organization.
