

## WAR TIME MATERIAL EXHIBIT IS PLANNED FOR INDIANA FAIR

Featuring the annual state and civic Fourth of July celebration which will be given at the Indiana state fair grounds under the auspices of the Marion County Council of the American Legion will be a monster exhibit of war-time materials and articles of ordnance, products of Indianapolis producers, it was announced today. Indianapolis manufacturers have been approached on the subject and have expressed favor of the plan, and it is likely that such an exhibit would establish a precedent, insofar as no other attempts have been made to forward a display of the products manufactured during the war.

To Entertain Delegates  
Plans rapidly are being developed whereby delegations from surrounding cities may be accommodated throughout the day, and most recent developments is the announcement that in the evening, at the time of the probable finish of the Marathon race which will be staged under the direction of the Amateur Athletic Union, a picnic will be held on the grounds. A committee has been appointed to arrange for the parking of automobiles and every effort is being made to insure safety to visitors.

Nine military bands have been obtained to play during the day and a recent announcement states that probably the Great Lakes Naval Training Station band will head the list. All of the bands will appear in the parade which will be formed directly in front of the state house at 10 o'clock. Several organizations of soldiers of other wars, besides various posts of the American Legion and affiliated organizations, have arranged to be in the parade. American Legion posts in the state desiring to march in the parade are asked to communicate with the Marion County Council of the American Legion, 331 K. of P. building, Indianapolis, Ind., and reservations will be made. Prizes are to be offered for units having the largest percentage of membership in the parade, as will be prizes for the best float, and for the winners in the athletic contests.

## NEW TRANSFER LAW NOT IN EFFECT YET

(By Associated Press.)

INDIANAPOLIS, June 9.—Officials of more than 1,000 school corporations scattered throughout Indiana are being advised by the state department of education that no change must be made this year in determining the per capita basis of charges for the transfer of pupils.

A new law, passed by the last legislature, provides that one of the elements for figuring the per capita charge for pupils transferred from their local school unit to another must be a return in the valuation of the school property. This law, according to the state officials, is not applicable for determining charges for this year in that it is held to require a new valuation of school property which will not be made until next year. On account of this state officials advised the local school authorities to determine the per capita basis the same as last year.

The question of the transfer charges was raised by Superintendent Jermon of the Greensburg city schools but the answer given him, after consultation with the attorney-general's office, is also being communicated to

## NOTABLES TO INSPECT WATERWAYS ROUTE; STATE REPRESENTED

(By Associated Press)

DULUTH, Minn., June 9.—Date of an inspection tour over the proposed St. Lawrence waterways route by cabinet members, governors, senators and others has been set for July 11 to 15, it was announced today by Charles P. Craig, executive director of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence tidewater association, which will sponsor the trip.

Prominent men invited to make the trip include Secretary of Commerce Hoover, Secretary of Agriculture Wallace, Secretary of the Navy Denby, the governors, senators and representatives from the council of states—an organization of officials from New England States. Secretaries Hoover and Wallace already have accepted the invitation, Mr. Craig said.

The journey has been arranged according to Mr. Craig, to provide the cabinet heads on others having a direct concern in the proposed waterway with first hand knowledge of problems involved. Engineers and economists who have made surveys of the route will accompany the delegation to explain the various phases.

To inspect Canal.  
The party will assemble at Niagara Falls June 9 and 10, according to present plans. The tour will open July 11, with an inspection of the new Welland canal and conclude July 15, at Montreal.

The tide-water association has accepted an invitation of the Canadian government, which Craig said, "signifies its wish to extend its hospitality to the official party as long as they may be in Canadian territory or upon boundary waters."
