

100 EPISCOPALIANS TO ATTEND BANQUET OPENING CONFERENCE

Reservations for 100 Episcopalians of the Indianapolis Diocese have been made for a supper to be given in the Y. M. C. A. at 6:30 o'clock Tuesday evening.

At 8 o'clock, the first session of the three day conference for church workers opens in the St. Paul's Episcopal church. Bishops Irving Peake Johnson, of Colorado, and James Wise of Kansas, were expected to arrive in this city at 3:45 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. They will make addresses at the opening of the conference Tuesday night.

The Rt. Rev. Joseph M. Francis, of Indianapolis, bishop of the Indiana Diocese, is to motor to Richmond Tuesday afternoon. Nearly all of those who will attend the conference will arrive Tuesday afternoon and evening, according to the Rev. G. G. Burbank, pastor of the local Episcopal church.

To Serve Breakfast

Bishops Johnson and Wise will remain at the Westcott hotel, but most of those to attend will be entertained in the homes of local church members. Breakfast will be served Wednesday and Thursday mornings at 8 o'clock in the St. Paul's church.

MORE AUTOMOBILES NEEDED TO TRANSPORT CHILDREN TO GLEN MILLER PARK FOR OUTING

More automobiles are needed to transport little children to and from Glen Miller park Wednesday, "All School Day."

Score of Richmond automobile owners have volunteered the use of their services and cars for the purpose, but more are necessary. Nearly 1,000 children of the kindergarten, first and second grades of the local public schools must be transported. It is the purpose to make the day the greatest in the history of the Richmond public school system. Officials ask for friendly co-operation.

Those who will volunteer their cars to take the children to the park, and return them in the afternoon, Wednesday, are asked to telephone N. F. Pultz, number 5277, before 6 o'clock tonight, or at 4:10 after 6 o'clock.

Companies Supply Trucks.
In addition to the scores of names of persons who are to haul the children, which was published Monday, the following companies will supply trucks in which food and other supplies will be delivered:

George H. Knollenberg company; Jones Hardware company, A. H. Bartel company, International Harvester company, Reed Furniture company, J. W. Grubb company, Swayne Robinson company, E. G. Hill company, Richmond Storage company and the National Automatic Tool company.

The parade will start promptly at 8:30 o'clock Wednesday morning, said a school official, Tuesday. He warned citizens who wished to see the parade to be on hand at that time or they would miss the sight. "We intend to get the children to the park and under the shade of the trees by 9:30 o'clock."

Joseph Moore School Leads.

Schools will form into ranks on North A street between Sixth and Eleventh streets. When all is in readiness, the Joseph Moore school, situated between Sixth and Seventh streets, will march between the long lines of school children to North Tenth and A streets. At this point the parade will march south to Main street and then east to the park. Each school will fall in line as the one preceding it passes by on North A street.

"ALL SCHOOL DAY."

Facts and Warnings.
1. Do not drive vehicles into Glen Miller park Wednesday. Nearly 5,000 children will be enjoying a picnic.

2. Park no car on North A street between Sixth and Eleventh, or on Main street from Tenth to the Glen park, between 8 and 9:30 o'clock Wednesday morning. Hundreds of kiddies will be on these streets during the time specified.

3. Boy patrols are formed to make the day safe for all, and particularly the little folks. If they approach you with suggestions or requests, kindly respect them.

4. Every man, woman and child in the city is welcome to witness the "All School Day" program Wednesday. Parents are especially invited.

5. Any information desired about children at the park, or events to take place, should be made Wednesday, at the park pavilion. It will be central headquarters for the day.

Assign Schools.
Marching order as announced includes the heading of the parade by a large American flag; next comes the high school drum corps; officials of the public school board; Joseph Moore school and cars; conveying the first and second grade pupils; Warner school and cars; Finley school and cars; Seavastopol school and cars; Hibberd school and cars; Whitewater and cars; Starr school and cars; Junior high school; high school band; high school student body.

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TROUBLE FOR TEN YEARS

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one of them to be found when sought portions of the park allotted for the individual schools, and the school to occupy each are as follows:

Joseph Moore. Children of this school will camp on a section of ground near the west entrance of the park, with North D street bounding their territory on the north and North Twenty-second street on the west. The road entering the park near Twenty-second street will run along the east side of their camp.

Schools Separated.
Baxter—This school will occupy the same plot of ground as that belonging to Joseph Moore school, but will be in front of the first school, nearer the Main street entrance at Twenty-second street. A footpath will separate the two schools.

Warner—Students of Warner school will be across the road from the Baxter school. This places them near the Twenty-second street entrance, but on the right hand side of the road leading into the park from Main street.

Finley—Finley school pupils will be immediately back of Warner school. Their location places them between the two roads leading into the park from Main street, but far enough in the rear to bring them near the four springs on the road leading from the park entrance on the east.

Hibberd—This school will camp between the foot path leading into the chautauqua grounds from Main street and the east park entrance of Main street.

Seavastopol—Children representing this school will find their picnic grounds in the rear of the park at the top of the hill which slopes down to the last spring. This brings them across the road from the park play grounds.

Valle—Students of Valle school will be on the same side of the road as those of Seavastopol, but to the west of the Seavastopol school for children. A parking ground for automobiles will be yet further to the west of the school.

Starr—Starr school children will occupy ground just back of the four springs on the road leading into the park from the East Main street entrance.

Whitewater—Festival hill, the stretch of ground to the east of the play grounds and near Glenwood avenue which leads up the hill around

the zoo, is retained for Whitewater school.

Garfield—Students of this school will be stationed across the road from Festival hill. Their territory will include the portion of ground to the east as far as the old log house.

High school—Those picnicking from high school will find their camp to the east of that occupied by Garfield. A foot path running to the east of the old log school house will separate the two schools.






