

## MAY CLEAR BUILDING SITUATION BY NEW WRITTEN AGREEMENT

Members of the Building Trades council have proposed a compromise with the Master Builder's association to end the building tie-up which has been in progress in the city for the past two weeks, it was stated Thursday morning.

A conference of the representatives from both organizations held Wednesday failed to reach any definite agreement although several matters were agreed to as a means of preliminary settlement.

The Trades Council offered to meet the Builders half way in the wage scale dispute by accepting 80 cents an hour. This is a reduction of five cents. The contractors are still holding out for the original demand of 75 cents. Leaders of both organizations state they expect the difficulty to be ironed out by the end of this week and building activities started.

The committees from both organizations will go further into the question Thursday. A written agreement between the employers and employees is being prepared and will be the final basis on which work is resumed.

## SONS OF VETS URGE OLD GLORY DISPLAY

Fitting display of the American flag on all patriotic occasions, and the cooperation of all other patriotic organizations in this respect are urged in resolutions adopted by the William P. Benton post of the Sons of Veterans, at their last regular meeting.

Following are the resolutions adopted by the post:

Whereas, One of the cardinal principles of the order of Sons of Veterans, is to demand of all citizens undivided loyalty and the highest type of Americanism, and require the exclusion of all aliens unwilling to conform to this standard; to teach patriotism, the duties of citizenship, the true history of our country, and the love and honor of our flag, therefore be it

Resolved, That we condemn the teaching of all foreign languages, except as they are a part of studies in our public schools; and request the enforcement of the law which prohibits the teaching of the German language therein.

Resolved, That we aid and encourage the display of Old Glory on every public school house, during the school term, and that we ask that the flag be displayed on all public buildings within the county, especially upon the occasion of every public holiday, and be it further

"Resolved, That we appeal to the patriotic citizenship of this community for a proper observance of all patriotic holidays, and that due respect be accorded to the men who saved the Union, and those of all other wars, upon each and every occasion. That we ask the aid and co-operation of all other patriotic organizations in the county in carrying out the spirit of these resolutions."

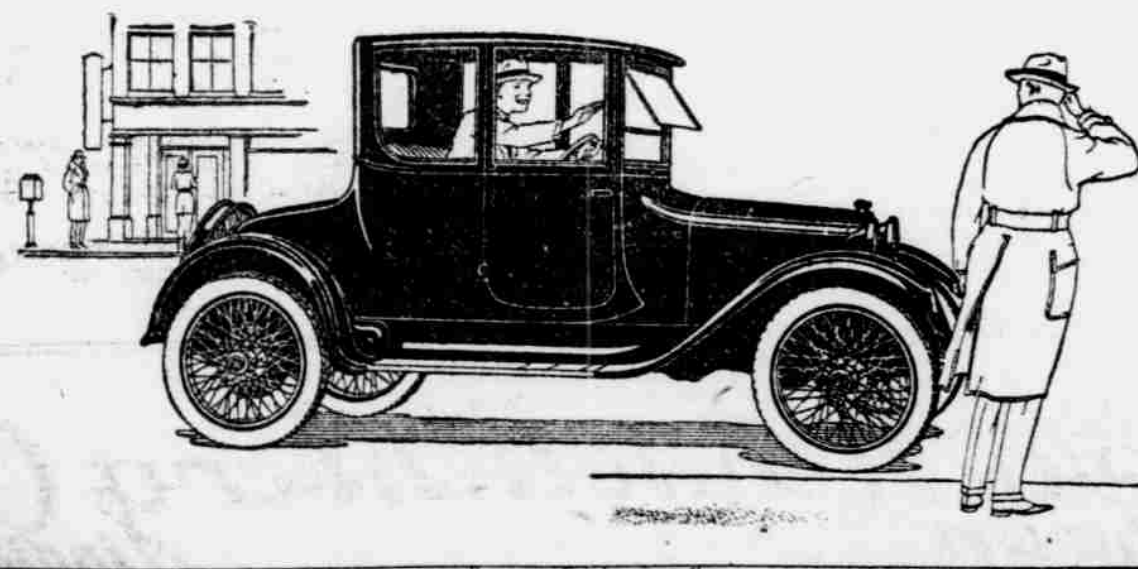
