"A WORD ABOUT SHOES.

We are all grateful for the warm weather which allows us to go about with low shoes and free ankles. The feet and the ankles are much healthier in summer simply because of this greater freedom. But there is one danger to the foot that comes from wearing summer shoes and that is the danger of not giving it proper support.

Pumps are so becoming and so good looking that their popularity will probably always continue, but they are not the healthiest sort of shoe. They do allow almost perfect ventilation of the foot because they are loose and light, but they do not give the foot and ankle the support it should have. This is particularly true of the high heeled pump which is the favorite choice of almost every woman because it makes the foot look smaller. A low heeled pump is not so bad since it allows the weight of the body to rest on the heel and the ball of the foot. Probably the ideal shoe is the Oxford with a low or military heel. This gives a support around the heel and over the ball of the foot, and over the instep as well. The new types of pump that have straps coming over the instep are, however, almost as good and, of course, much dressier in appearance.

To be healthy as well as good looking, the shoe should fit very snugly

under and around the instep. Cheap shoes are always made very wide at this place, so that the middle part of the foot is allowed to settle down without any support. The instep has
