

EATON LEGION POST MAY BE SPONSOR FOR CHAUTAUQUA IN 1922

EATON, O., July 29.—Indications at this time are Eaton will have another chautauqua course next year, but it has not been determined whether the old chautauqua committee or St. Clair post, American Legion, will sponsor the course.

The committee seemingly hesitated tackling the undertaking for next year and J. W. Huffman, chautauqua superintendent, took up the proposition with the Legion Post, the executive committee of which signified the post's willingness to assume the responsibility of the meeting next year. Final decision of the committee has not yet been officially announced.

W. E. Reel, chairman of the chautauqua committee, has given out a financial statement showing the committee has a deficit of about \$20 this year, although the treasury has a balance of \$250. The object of the reserve fund was to establish a local playground for children, when the fund grew sufficiently large.

This season's chautauqua came to a close Thursday evening, after a seven-day session. A grand concert was the closing attraction. Paul W. Ward lectured in the afternoon.

Start Eastern Star Chapter.
