

DAVID ELLIOTT SUES FOR PART INTEREST IN FATHER'S LAND

EATON, O., Aug. 10.—Partition of 162 acres of land in Dixon township, belonging to the late John Elliott, is sought in a common pleas court action brought by David C. Elliott, against William S. Elliott and 20 other defendants, including the board of foreign missions of the Presbyterian church of America.

The plaintiff, as a son of the late Elliott, who died in 1875, claims he is entitled to a 74-252 part of the realty. Lulu Kenworthy and Ida Fouts are suing Martha and F. M. Neff and James White for foreclosure of a mortgage securing \$800 worth of notes. Plaintiffs aver the notes were turned over to them by F. G. Shuey, as executor of the estate of the late Peter Fouts. It is averred White claims a dower interest in the realty, which embraces about 93 acres in Somers township.

Many Want Postal Position.

While the number is not definitely known, several applicants took the civil service examination for the postmaster appointment at Eaton. The time limit for the examination expired Tuesday.

The examination was conducted under the questionnaire plan and transmitted to the proper postal head in Washington. It is understood two or three Democrats took the quiz.

The county Republican committee had recommended and endorsed E. E. Bailey, insurance man and party worker, for the postmastership.

Dr. W. H. Bucke, Democrat, is the present postmaster. It is not known if he took the examination, just closed.

Written examination for the postmaster appointment at Camden, third class office, will be conducted next Saturday.

Mike Mariso, 32, Italian, residing on New Paris R. F. D. No. 3, filed his petition, or second papers, for citizenship here Tuesday in common pleas court.

Mariso's declaration, or first papers, of citizenship, was filed in Richmond, Ind., in September, 1917. He was born at Rocco Raspidi, Italy, and came to this country in 1909. He has a wife and one child.
