MURRAY

Although Eva Novak scored emphatic hits in her first two starring vehicles, "Wanted at Headquarters" and "The Torrent", her role of the New York society girl in "Society Secrets", coming to the Murray Theater on Monday, is sure to establish her as a prime favorite. It is not only one of the most sympathetic characters ever created for the screen, but is equally rich in opportunities for pathos and humor.

CHICAGO POOR KIDDIES ENJOY FARM OUTINGS

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 20.—Nearly two hundred children of the Chicago slums already have received two-weeks outings this summer in farm houses of Illinois Agricultural association members. Requests have come in to the association from its members for 350 children since the farmers, in co-operation with the United Charities of Chicago, began in July their project to provide vacations for the youngsters of the tenements.

Almost all the children have gone to 13 Illinois counties, all within a radius of less than a hundred miles from Chicago. Railroads have been offering free fare to children on outings.

hence no surprise has been expressed among members of Indiana's political colony in Washington over Judge Gray's announced change of residence from Connorsville to Liberty, Ind.

Judge Gray has been in Washington almost continuously since last spring, but the nature of his business here has not been revealed. His activities, however, have been known to take him as far as the executive offices of the White House. He has been a power in Democratic politics in the sixth district of Indiana for a number of years and is regarded as one of the shrewdest politicians in the state.

Tague Candidate

Cecil C. Tague, of Brookville, who represented Franklin county in the state senate last winter and is said to have been the author of the law which created the Union-Franklin judicial circuit, now serves as judge of the new circuit, having received his appointment from Governor McCray.

Brookville, is expected to oppose Tague for the Republican nomination. It is understood that there will be several candidates for the Democratic nomination for judge in addition to Gray.

Miss Alice Robertson, the only woman member of congress, and, oddly enough, a pronounced anti-suffragist, has again aroused the ire of the woman suffrage leaders in Washington. "Miss Alice" is opposed to having a woman included among the members of the delegation which is to represent the United States at the forthcoming disarmament conference, a proposal which is being ardently championed by several suffrage organizations.

"Show me a woman in the United States who is qualified, and I might urge her appointment," says the lady from Oklahoma, adding that no woman, to her knowledge, "possesses the necessary knowledge of diplomacy and the faculty of listening a great deal and saying little."

The remarks attributed to "Miss Alice" have drawn fire from Mrs. Richard Edwards, vice-president of the National Women's Party, who says: "What Miss Robertson says or thinks is negligible. She is a political accident and in no way represents women, though she sits as the only woman in congress."

Up to this time no mere male politician has had the temerity to mix into the row. It is generally understood that a woman will not be included as a member of the disarmament delegation.
