

METHODIST BISHOP PREDICTS 7,000,000 FOLLOWERS BY 1940

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 11.—Bishop Homer C. Stunts of Omaha, Neb., speaking Thursday night at a meeting of Indiana Methodist ministers and laymen in Tomlinson hall, predicted that by 1940 there will be at least 7,000,000 Methodist church members throughout the world, backing an unequaled evangelistic program. The meeting was one of the closing sessions of the state conference.

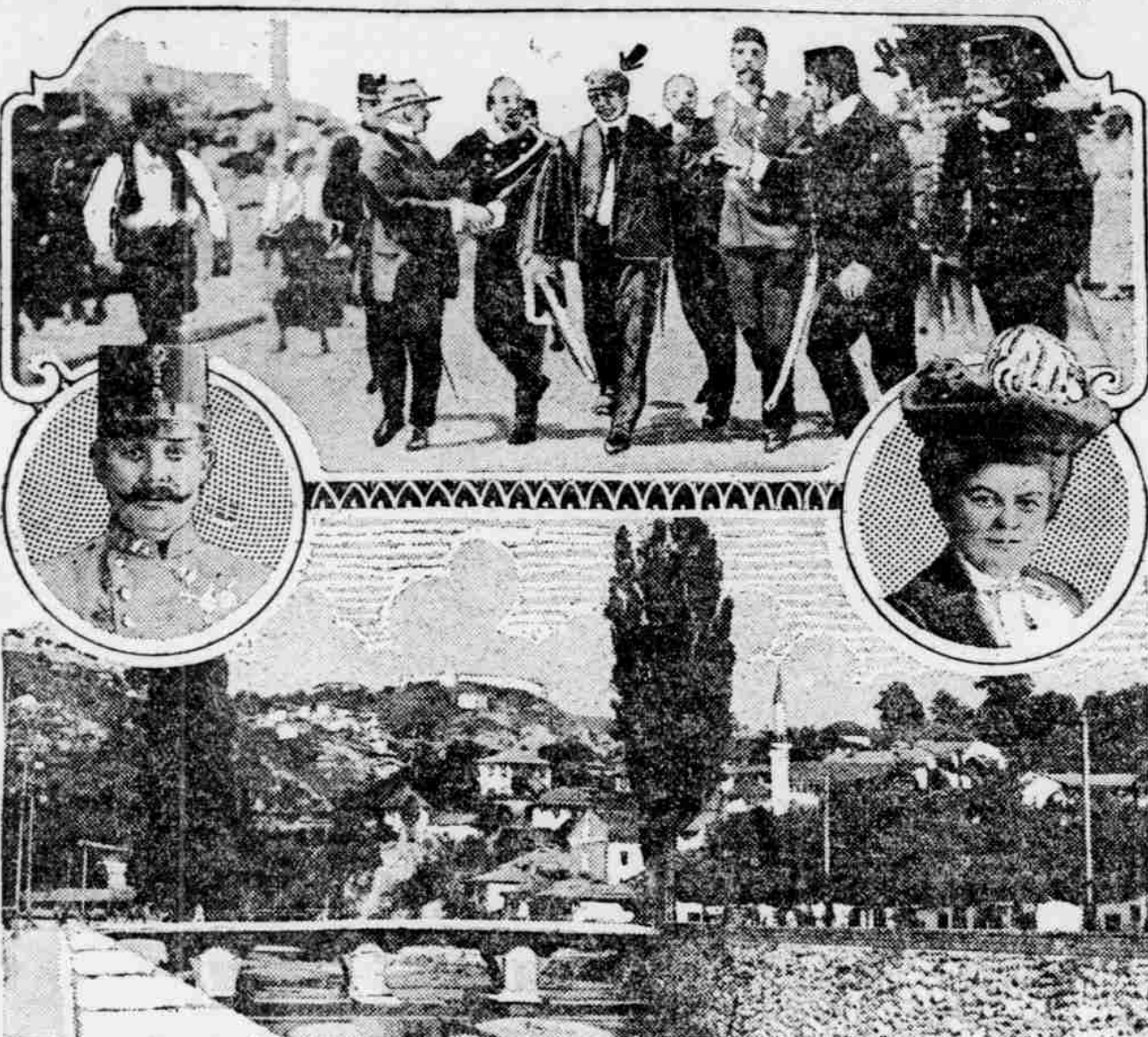
Bishop Stunts, who spoke on "The Future of Methodism," addressed another meeting at Roberts Park M. E. church on "The Outlook for the Church." More than 5,000 people attended the meetings.

"Our general conferences in the next two or three decades must make ample provision for the growing Methodist units in all ends of the earth," he said. "Since the famous Christmas conference of 1784 Methodism has become the most numerous body of adult, disciplined Protestants in the world. There are now between 4,000,000 and 5,000,000 members in its fold and its preaching and literary work is done through a medium of 127 languages and on every continent except Australia.

"In the future we must keep emphasis upon Christian experience and demand the adjustment of social and industrial relations upon the principles of Christian brotherhood rather than economic advantage.

Old Basis of Giving Gone.
The Methodist Episcopal church, which has paid out \$35,000,000 for benevolent purposes since June 1, 1919, and has given in its pledge of \$100,000,000 in the centenary campaign, can never go back again to the old basis of giving. Dr. R. J. Wade of Chicago, corresponding secretary of the committee on conservation and advancement of the Methodist Episcopal church, said at the Tomlinson hall meeting last night.

Armistice Day Recalls Incident Used as Excuse to Start War

Celebration of Armistice Day recalls the world war and the flimsy pretext used by Austria and Germany to plunge Europe into bloody strife. On June 28, 1914, the Archduke Francis Ferdinand of Austria and his

morganatic wife, the Duchess of Hohenberg, were slain by a young Serbian student, Gavril Princip. On July 23 the Austrian government, on the pretext that such a step was necessary in order to get the individuals

who had plotted Ferdinand's death, sent an ultimatum to Serbia, practically demanding that that country surrender its sovereignty to Austria. When Serbia refused to agree to the ultimatum Austria declared war on her July 28.

Accompanied only by "Lady Bird," her horse, which she bought in Seattle in June, 1915, and "Za Za," a Boston terrier, Miss Thingelstad soon is to start for Kansas City. Next spring she will leave on the last lap of her trip home.

She has worked practically at every occupation a woman can do, supporting herself and her companions, and preparing for future trips. Her first consideration, invariably, is for her animals.

With a complete knowledge of office work, she avoided large cities and always sought occupations local to the community where she was stopping.

She prefers to camp out at night but does no cooking on the road, buying

all her meals at restaurants or houses along her way. Each night she plans to reach a farmhouse where a comfortable stall may be provided for Lady Bird, but she and Za Za sleep in the yard or in the orchard, using the blankets she carries strapped to her saddle.

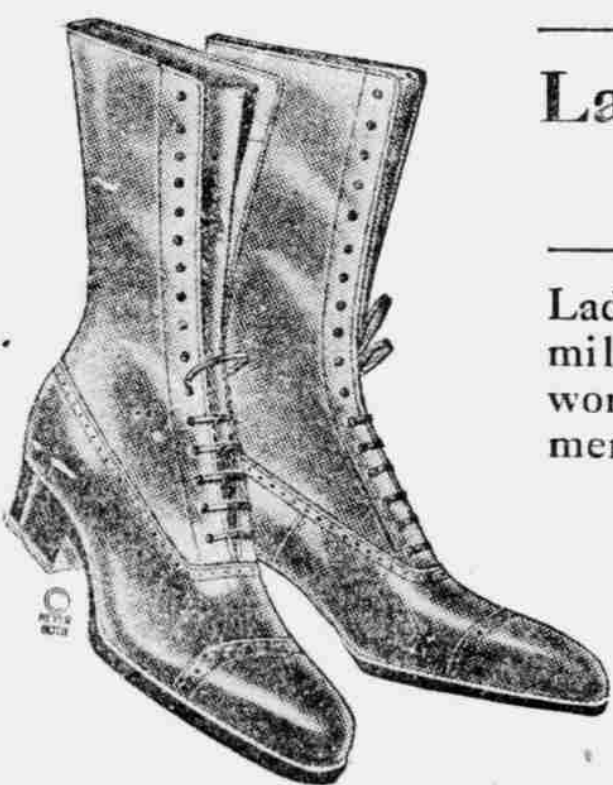

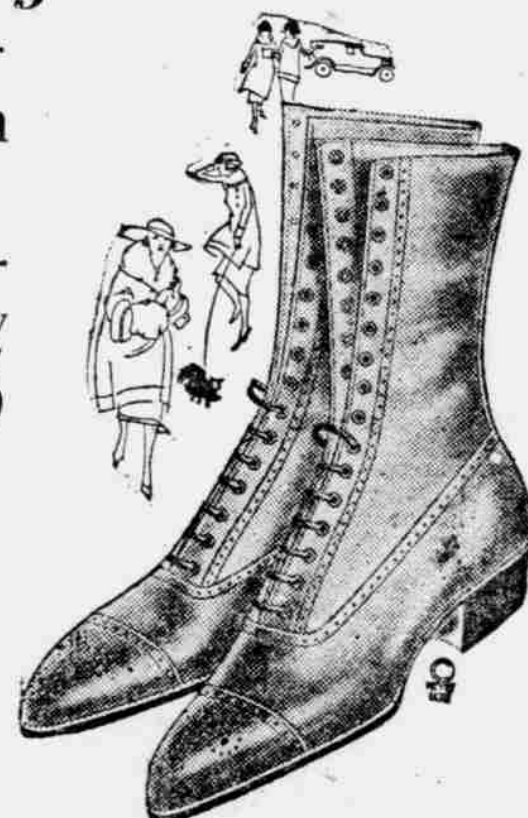
