

## ILLUSTRATED LECTURE ON TUBERCULOSIS AT HIGH SCHOOL TONIGHT

An illustrated lecture, with slides showing various stages of the disease, causes and methods of prevention of tuberculosis will be given by Dr. H. W. McKane, of the tuberculosis division of the state board of health, in the high school auditorium Tuesday evening. The lecture will start at 8 o'clock.

Dr. McKane's lecture is the second local step taken in a campaign for the prevention of tuberculosis in this community. The campaign is educational in character.

At 2 o'clock Monday afternoon, the first free clinic was given in this city, when some 17 patients were examined by Dr. J. H. Stygall. The clinic was given under the auspices of the state tuberculosis association, which is co-operating with the tuberculosis division of the state board of health, in this work.

Seven "Positive" Cases  
Of the 17 patients examined Monday, seven were found to be "positive," that is, afflicted with tuberculosis in more or less advanced form. Recommendations were made to these patients regarding their manner of living, and where they might obtain treatment.

"Tuberculosis is really a childhood disease," said Dr. McKane, Monday. "Eighty per cent of the people acquire this disease to some extent during life. Some say the percentage is even higher. Then some particular condition, a strenuous life, or some other factor, may bring it to the surface."

Dr. Stygall, who was here at the clinic Monday, has engagements up to Dec. 22 with the various Indiana counties. At each of these counties he conducts a clinic similar to that given here.

Dr. McKane lectured in Dublin Monday evening. He will appear in the high school auditorium at 8 o'clock Tuesday evening.

## GRAIN GROWERS' CHIEF PROPOSES PROTECTION AGAINST FAKE BODIES

CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—C. H. Gustafson, president of the United States Grain Growers' association, proposed to the National Association of State Marketing officials here today that it take steps for the protection of farmers from fake co-operative schemes. Mr. Gustafson heads the largest co-operative grain marketing corporation of farmers in the country.

A number of strictly commercial concerns have been floated under the guise of co-operative enterprise, he reported. Frequently these have just enough of the earmarks of co-operative organizations to mislead and misguide, he said.

"The co-operative movement has attained a place and gathered a momentum that was undreamed of a few years ago," Mr. Gustafson declared. "Naturally it has created opportunity for fraud and misrepresentation by men and organizations with selfish and unworthy purposes."

**Sustains Objections**  
Mr. Gustafson told the state marketing officials that no objection could be made to their discouragement of organizations having for their purpose merely the exploitation of co-operative sentiment.

"I believe that much good might be done," he said, "through a campaign of education that does not directly attack any one by name but which is directed toward driving home certain fundamentals of co-operation."

The co-operative grain marketing leader defended government marketing agencies which have been criticized for aiding farmers in developing the co-operative marketing of their products. He declared he was opposed to government aid and subsidy of any industry.

**MARSHAL FOCH INITIATED**  
**CHIEF OF CHIEFS OF CROWS**  
BILLINGS, Mont., Nov. 29.—Marshal Foch yesterday was inducted into the Crow Indian tribe at an elaborate ceremony at the Indian reservation near here and given the name "Ah-Way-Ko-Ta-Ba-Chi-Chish," meaning "Chief of Chiefs." The name was bestowed upon the French marshal by Chief Plenty Coups of the Crows. The latter battlefield also was visited yesterday.

Colonel Jack Addie will assist in the revival services to be held in Richmond at the Salvation Army home at 12 South Fifth street starting Nov. 30 and ending Dec. 5. Colonel Addie will wind up the services at the First M. E. church Monday night, Dec. 5, with his famous lecture, "Modern Miracles."

Lieut. Colonel Addie has been detailed for special service by the Salvation Army and is now traveling throughout the central states organizing and conducting religious campaigns and revival meetings. Colonel Addie will conduct meetings at the local Salvation Army quarters at 12 South Fifth street from Nov. 30 to Dec. 5.

Lieut. Colonel Addie was born in Scotland and has served as a soldier and officer of the Salvation Army for over 40 years. He came with his parents to Canada as a boy and at the age of 19 years began the first Salvation Army work in Canada, and from his pioneer work the Army has grown to large proportions in the Dominion. After serving 10 years in Canada he came to the United States and was in charge of the work in Illinois for six years, and for four years in charge of the Army work in Ohio. He was then transferred to Kansas City as provincial officer in charge of the entire southwest, and six years later removed the southwestern headquarters to St. Louis, where he remained for four years.

Colonel Addie was then attached to the western territorial headquarters at Chicago and for five years had entire charge of Men's Social and Prison Work of the Salvation Army west of the Mississippi river. While directing this work he became known to

thousands of prisoners in the state penitentiaries as "Colonel Jack." Colonel Addie also organized the Anti-Suicide Bureau of the Salvation Army and is given credit for saving thousands of people from self-destruction. This is one of the unique features of the Salvation Army service and his work in organizing the bureau has made for him a national reputation.
