

HOGS, SHEEP, LAMBS HIGHER, CATTLE AVERAGE LOWER LAST WEEK, SANBORN'S REVIEW SHOWS

The vagaries of the live stock market are often hard to account for. Take the price of sheep and lambs last week for example. With receipts of \$5,000 head up to Friday night both sheep and lambs advanced right along at Chicago, good weathers selling as high as \$8 and best western lambs bringing up to \$13.25. These prices held on Saturday.

Now, then, this range brought the average price of good fat lambs up to \$12.75 on the week's arrivals, a net gain of \$4 per cwt., inside of nine weeks, when the average was down to \$8.70. And more than this, lambs averaged higher in the west last week than on any date since November, 1920. Packers explain that, after all, it has been a matter of supply and demand entirely, as to lambs, for the meat eaters have demanded more lamb chops than the supply, liberal as it has been, has afforded. All right, what's the answer? How does it come that consumers "have returned to their mutant," and at much higher prices? What was the matter with lamb chops and roasts when the price was one-third lower, and when ordinary sheep were selling for freight and commission charges, or thereabout?

Supplies Running Short

One Chicago market reporter says: "There is some talk of importing frozen mutton, but the urgency of demand will eat up big quantities of stuff from abroad, without forcing much reaction as home supplies are unquestionably short." As a matter of fact we have imported millions of pounds of South American and New Zealand lamb within the past two or three years, so much so, in fact, that western carcasses could not compete in eastern markets, except at a loss, on more than one occasion. The facts were printed in this column from time to time, when whole ship loads of frozen stuff were brought in. But that the supply is comparatively short can not be denied. Raising wool and mutton at a loss has resulted in the sacrificing a large percentage of the ewes as lambs. We shall discover this fact in our marketing operations before long. It takes time to build up stocks.

Trend of Hog Market.

The receipts of hogs at Chicago last week, at 222,100 head, were the third largest since last February. The "average" price on Saturday was \$8.20, the top average figure since Sept. 2, 1921. Selected lights and pigs scored as high as \$8.75, the top of the week. The estimated average weight on last week's drives was 224, against 226 pounds in the previous week.

With hogs better than holding their own and lambs averaging \$12.75 on the week, the highest in about 15 months, one might have reasonably looked for a firm and slightly higher market for cattle last week. To the contrary the market was soft. As a matter of fact beef steers finished the week at an average loss of 25 cents compared with a week earlier, or at \$6.90 against \$7.15 for the week ending Jan. 14. Some kinds of cattle lost even more.

The Indianapolis Market.
Compared with the week ending Jan. 14, when good choice light hogs sold at \$8.35 to \$8.65 on Saturday, hogs scored an advance of 35¢ to 50¢ at Indianapolis. Best lights made a top of






