

BARNARD, NEWCASTLE QUILTS COMMISSION TO PRACTICE LAW

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 24.—The termination of George Barnard, of Newcastle, to resign as a member of the public service commission to become a member of the law firm reorganized by the old firm of Myers, Gates and Ralston here, was announced last night. Mr. Barnard is a Republican and formerly was mayor of Newcastle.

He will be succeeded on the commission by Senator Oscar Ratts, of Paoli.

In the new firm, which will be headed by former Governor S. M. Ralston and E. E. Gates, this city, Fred M. Van Nuys, who recently retired as district attorney, will become a member. Moses B. Lairy, formerly a judge of the supreme court, also will be a member of the firm. The firm will be known as Ralston, Gates, Lairy, Van Nuys and Barnard.

Quincy A. Myers, formerly a judge of the supreme court, who was head of the firm, died recently.

REORGANIZE PREBLE BOARD OF EDUCATION; ELECT BIERLY AS HEAD

EATON, Ohio, Jan. 24.—Reorganization of the new Preble county board of education has been effected by electing Homer Bierly, twin township, president; Harry Mills, Jefferson township, vice-president, and County School Superintendent Walter S. Fogarty, of Eaton, clerk.

Bierly, Mills and A. H. Morton, Israel township, are the new members of the board, while C. D. Ulrich and Josiah Flora are old members. Ulrich is the only Democrat on the board. R. K. DeMotte, E. C. Eikenberry and Charles Ware are retiring members.

The old board was defendant in injunction actions against creation of new school districts and the suits were carried to the court of appeals, where the board got the decision dissolving injunctions. The board voted to drop these actions and it is expected the districts involved in creating new territory, and which was affirmed by court of appeals, will be put back as they were before the court litigation started, or at least an effort will be made to do so, it is thought.

A county teachers' institute will be conducted next summer, the board approving the annual meeting.

New Equipment at Liberty

The Boy Scouts have purchased a Westinghouse wireless receiving set and expect to receive shipment in about 30 days. The apparatus costs \$216. All but about \$50 of the amount needed to pay for the apparatus has been raised by popular subscription. After the apparatus has been installed, concerts will be given free at the library one night a week. It will be possible to receive here grand opera from Chicago, New York stock news, sporting news, weather reports and the like. Various companies in Liberty have agreed to conduct and finance the installation of the plant. Liberty Light and Power company will do all the work on the antenna; J. L. Pierson and Son will furnish all batteries, and Fred Russell, Delco Light dealer, will furnish all switches and necessities.

New Winchester Station
A Grebe set has been installed at the Davis garage which is now ready to receive any of the telephone broadcasting in the country. This station is a very well equipped one, and will prove popular. The antenna is strung on the roof of the building. Mr. Davis plans to post the market, weather and news broadcasts of The Palladium.

On the evening of Tuesday, Jan. 24, Madame Else Arendt, soprano, will sing over the wireless from Chicago. Her program will include Godard's "Le Tasse" Aria, Ganz' "Memory," and "The Years at the Spring," by Beach. She will sing between 8 and 9 o'clock. Madame Arendt will be remembered by many who heard her here a year ago.

The next evening, on Wednesday, January 25, at 7 o'clock, immediately following the Palladium broadcast, Paul Godley, who visited England to listen to the International trans-Atlantic tests, will make an address by wireless from the Radio corporation station at Roselle Park, Long Island, known to many as W.D.Y. The announcement of the address was heard Monday night by Richard Gatzek, but owing to local ORM from a spark coil or similar interference, he was unable to catch more and can not tell on what subject Godley will talk.

Farm Boys' Radio Club
A wireless concert was given not long ago by members of the Ocean County Wireless club, for the entertainment of the Farm Bureau, at Toms River, N. J. This club which was organized by the county club agent had succeeded in getting a central receiving station installed in the courthouse. The program, which was heard by the entire audience by means of an amplifier, came from Newark, N. J. It consisted of operatic solos, orchestral selections, a speech, and a radio club in that city within the next two weeks. Half a dozen amateurs are building sets now, in order to get achievements the boys in the wireless

club have been working toward for some months. The club was organized shortly after the United States department of agriculture began sending out market reports by wireless. Under the general supervision of the county club agent it has developed to a membership of 52 boys in all stages of wireless knowledge and equipment.

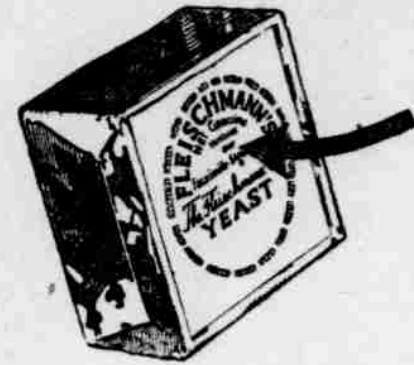
Use of Market Reports
The wireless is now being used by state and federal agencies to broadcast national and local agricultural market reports throughout virtually

the entire country. Reports on the national markets are dispatched daily by the United States department of agriculture from wireless stations of the postoffice department at Cincinnati, Omaha, Washington, North Platte, Nebr., Rock Springs, Wyo., Elko, Nev., and Reno, Nev. These reports are received by hundreds of amateur wireless operators. National market reports are also received by state bureaus of markets and agricultural colleges, supplemented with local market reports, and relayed by wireless

telegraphy and telephone to farmers, shipping associations, newspapers, banks, and other agricultural interests.

A most complete program in the dissemination of market reports by wireless is being planned by the state bureau of markets in Ohio, a specially constructed radiophone transmitter of the most improved type being installed in the radio station of the University of Ohio for that purpose.

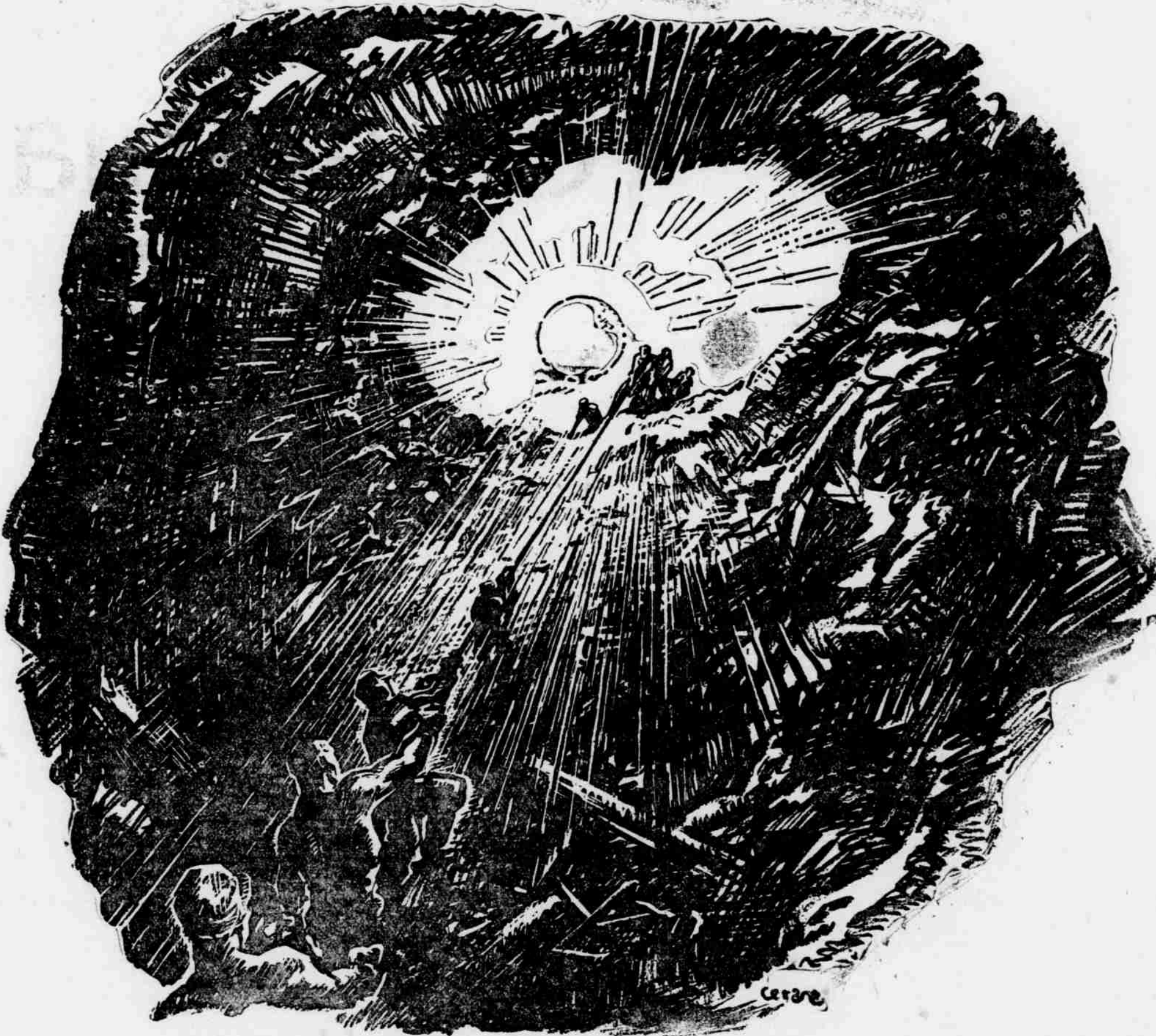
