

## WITHDRAW 2 SUITS AGAINST CAMPBELL, RETIRED FARMER

EATON, Ohio, March 6.—Two suits filed some time ago against J. W. Campbell, wealthy retired farmer, Eaton, in which rather sensational charges were made, were withdrawn Saturday from common pleas court by the plaintiffs, James M. Bishop and Joseph M. Doty, farmers.

In both suits Campbell was charged with obtaining money from the plaintiffs by "falsely and fraudulently and with intent to deceive," represent that "Campbell's name is a note for \$2,500." Bishop is a son of James M. Doty and a son-in-law of Doty.

Doty averred Campbell had obtained from him a note for \$600 and Bishop claimed a note for \$700 was obtained from him and that he had paid, by check, \$150 on the note.

**Court Approves Sale.**  
Common pleas court has approved sale of the Church of the Brethren church property, Richmond pike, near Eaton, to William H. Miller for \$550 cash. The property consists of a frame church building and one acre of ground. The trustees obtained permission to the court to sell the property because it had been abandoned as a place of worship.

**Risinger Reserves Decision.**  
Judge Abel Risinger heard the appealed case of P. O. Boston, Saturday, in common pleas court and reserved decision. Boston was declared guilty of violating the prohibition laws and was fined in a squire's court, after which he took appeal on error to the higher court.

An ejection action brought by Charles E. Cooper against Chester Francis was settled and dismissed Saturday from common pleas court. Francis occupied Cooper's farm in Gratis township.

Officers of the U. S. Grain Growers, Inc., have announced incorporation of the U. S. Grain Growers' Sales company, a subsidiary organization, which will plan to operate at once in Chicago, Kansas City, Omaha, Indianapolis and Minneapolis markets. The subsidiary organization will be the largest grain selling firm in the world.

More than 110,000,000 bushels of grain will be marketed each year by the selling company on present membership basis, officials said. Recently a membership campaign has resulted in an additional 2,000 farmer membership each week, thereby adding more than 4,000,000 bushels a week contracted with the farmers' organization.

## FIRST "GIBSON GIRL" SEEKS TO IMPROVE EDUCATION IN SOUTH

(By Associated Press)  
NEW YORK, March 6.—Southern women living in regions devoid of modern advantages, are to have education brought to them by a movement set on foot by two of the famed Langhorne sisters, of Richmond, Va.—Lady Astor and Mrs. Charles Dana Gibson.

Lady Astor, who was Nancy Langhorne, has sent her contribution to her sister, Mrs. Gibson, who was Irene Langhorne and the original "Gibson girl." Mrs. Gibson today sent out an appeal to women of the south now living in the north, asking for their support of the project.

Mrs. Gibson is vice chairman of the New York City branch of the Southern Women's Educational Alliance. Alliance officials say their organization contemplated the awarding of more than 100 scholarships for technical schools, colleges and "prep" schools; arrangements for loans for needy southern girls and also the conducting of vocational courses for girls in their teens.

"All of us realize that women are needing education now as never before," said Mrs. Gibson in her appeal, and thoughtful southern women who live outside the south realize more than any others could how meagre the outlook and chances of some southern girls are as compared with those of girls of other sections of the country."






