

WELFARE HALL TAKES CARE OF IDLE HOURS OF BOYS AT LIBERTY

LIBERTY, Ind., March 20.—Welfare Hall located in the heart of the town of Liberty fitted up with a wireless receiving station, pool table, card tables, and other devices for the amusement of the younger generation, is fulfilling long felt need among the boys of that town. The hall was fitted up as a form of Y. M. C. A. to care for the idle hours of the boys ranging in age from 10 to 21 years.

Round table discussion of the need for such a place was held early in the year, with Y. M. C. A. workers from Richmond and Oxford, Ohio, present. About 30 citizens were also present.

As a result of the discussion, it was decided to fit up the hall for the entertainment of the boys, with the understanding that it was not to be continued if it proved unpopular.

Proves Successful.
That it has proved successful is evidenced by the fact that a crowd of young fellows may be seen in the hall at all hours it is open. A supervisor is always in charge when the rooms are open. The hall is run under the direction of a number of committees known as supervisory, financial, social educational and equipment.

Roy Driggs, chairman of the equipment committee, made a valuable contribution to the hall in the form of five card tables, all manufactured by him. Members of the supervisory committee which has charge of the general direction of the hall, are: Albert Bertsch, chairman; Mrs. Frank Draper, Mrs. Dr. Donahue, A. A. Graham, Bruce Stevens, Rev. S. L. Martin, Russell Ratliff, Mrs. Charles Ross, Mrs. Elizabeth Mitchell and Miss Ruth Kitchel.

Hours Hall is Open
Doors of the hall are open from 3:30 o'clock to 10 o'clock each afternoon and evening. They are closed from 5:30 to 6:30 to allow the caretaker time for meals. Reading material has been ordered, and a candy case will be installed soon.

One night a week is to be set aside for the general public and entertainments of interest to the people will be given on these occasions, according to the plans of the committee. Wireless concerts, lectures and the like, will serve to make this hall a community center on such nights.

The wireless outfit in use at present was purchased by the local boy scout troop, and the antenna installed by the local electric light company. Concerts from Pittsburgh, Indianapolis, Newark, N. J., Detroit, Hamilton, Cincinnati, and other points have been picked up by the outfit.

60 Attend Program
The highwater mark in attendance was reached at an entertainment held Saturday evening when 60 boys were present in the hall. Boxing matches are one form of entertainment which has proved popular.

That the whole community is behind the movement is the statement of persons in charge of the hall.

San Jose scale and other species of scale insects have been rapidly increasing in Indiana the last two years. The past two mild winters have given the best of conditions for these scale insects to live through the winter and make a rapid increase in numbers. Nearly all scale insects, especially San Jose scale, are controlled by a spray of lime sulphur or miscible oil. Spraying must be done before the leaves come out. When the leaves are out, lime sulphur is used the dilution is

one gallon to eight of water. In case the powdered form is used, not less than two pounds to five gallons of water should be used. Dilute miscible oils according to directions on package.

The reason so many fail to control scale with these sprays is due to a lack of thoroughness in applying the spray, according to C. L. Burkholder of the horticultural staff of Purdue university. The entire surface of the tree or shrub must be completely covered with the spray. In the case of trees it seems necessary to apply the spray first, say with the wind in the south, and then go over the entire orchard again when the wind has changed into approximately the opposite direction. If this method is not followed there are sure to be strips and sections of the limbs which were not covered with the spray. This results in a bountiful supply of young scale in the early spring which quickly covers the tree again and does serious damage before fall. It is much safer to go over the orchard twice with the change of wind than to wait for a day theoretically without a wind. Potato soil should be plowed deep and early and reworked frequently until planting time, says a statement sent out from Purdue for the benefit of amateur and professional potato producers of Indiana.

Plowing ground as soon as it is dry and early planting are recommended for the best yields. The furrows may be opened and potatoes planted quickly and covered immediately before the ground dries, to promote early germination.

Saving on seed is a false economy according to Purdue. Twenty-five bushel yields an acre from potato peelings against 200 bushels from good seed are evidences of this fact. The seed pieces should be about the size of an egg.

Seed should be planted every foot for early potatoes, and three to six inches further apart for late crops, with the pieces cut just before dropping.

GALLANT CIVIL WAR BATTERY DEFEATED BY OLD FATHER TIME

CLEVELAND, Ohio, March 20.—The Cleveland Light Artillery, the gallant old battery that served in the Civil war and which is said to have fired the first shot at the Confederate forces in the first land battle of the war, has struck its flag to Father Time.

The last roll call of the organization, held on Washington's birthday, Feb. 22, following annual custom, was answered by only one of the two remaining veterans of the original battery and two honorary members who served with other Ohio batteries.

Nicholas Weidenkopf, 78, who was the youngest soldier in the Cleveland battery, called the roll and Rev. Henry C. Martindale, of Cleveland and Richard King, of Chardon, the two honorary members, responded. Henry Bebeck, the other survivor of the battery, was ill at his home here.

"It was the dying wish of Colonel James Barnett, that the last of us turn over the Cleveland artillery records to the Western Reserve Historic-

al society," said Mr. Weidenkopf. "I move that the Cleveland Light Artillery hereby disbands."

The motion carried and Weidenkopf was designated to present the records of the battery to the society.

TO SHOW COLORED SLIDES WITH LECTURES ON BIRDS

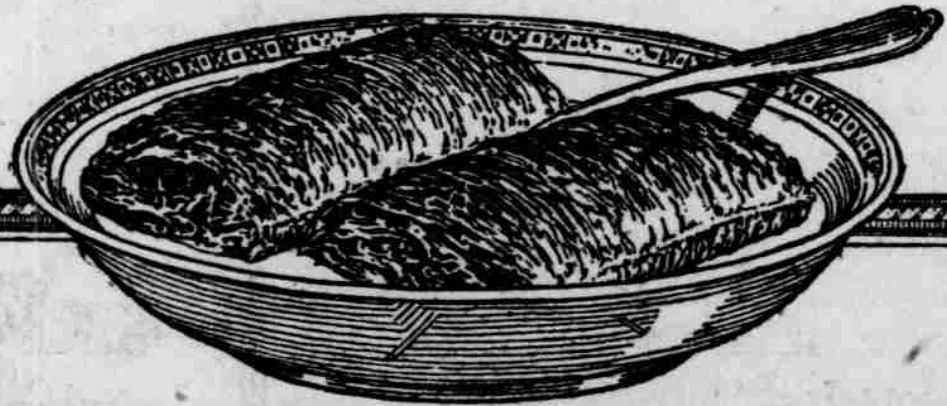
