

TENTH ANNIVERSARY OF ESTABLISHMENT OF GRANGE OBSERVED

NEW PARIS, Ohio, March 20.—The tenth anniversary of the establishment of the Whitewater Valley Grange was celebrated in the grange hall Saturday night. Music, a history of the grange by one of its oldest members, a home talent play, and refreshments served after the program, kept the members until a late hour.

A sextette of violins was responsible for much of the music, the violinists being Albert Garrison, Mary Alice Murray, Mildred Mitchell, Mary Coblenz, Donald Garrison and James Noakes. A piano solo by Miss Edith Bragg and violin solos by Mildred Mitchell and James Noakes with several vocal solos completed the musical program. In honor of St. Patrick's day, songs were in Irish theme, "A Little Bit of Heaven," by Mary Alice Murray, "Mother Machree," by J. W. Noakes and "Kathleen," by Mary Alice Murray, with choral accompaniment by a quartette.

A music drama, with the parts given in song was one of the features of the program. Those taking part were John Noakes, Mrs. Earl Mitchell and Mary Alice Murray. A reading was given by Hazel Luker.

Interest Shown.

Much interest was shown in a history of the Grange, given by one of the charter members, Mrs. Mary Reid. The Whitewater Valley Grange, she stated, was formed in March of 1912, William D. Arnold, now of Richmond, being its founder. Mr. Roy Schlotterbeck, then county deputy, assisted in its formation, and Robert Bunger, of Lewisburg, installed the first officers and gave the ritualistic work.

A juvenile Grange was formed in April of 1913 and continued for three years under direction of Mrs. A. J. Murray. The present hall was bought in 1914. The program was concluded by short talks by the charter members present and reading of greetings from those who had moved away.
