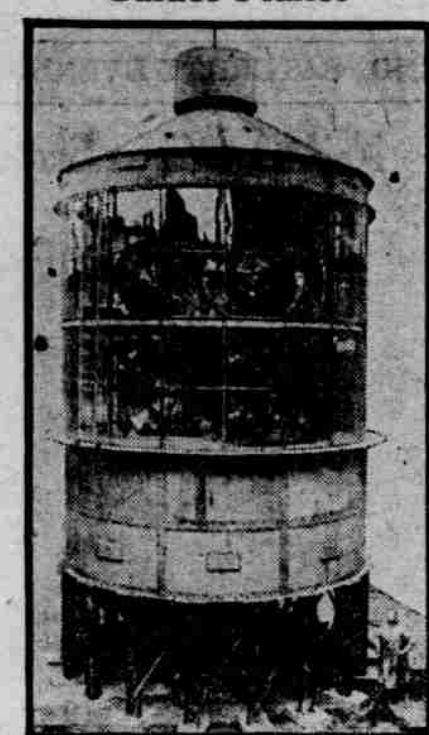

## TO USE RADIO PHONE IN SPEEDWAY CLASSIC

**INDIANAPOLIS, April 8.**—A wireless telephone will be used by one driver in the 500-mile automobile race at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway May 30 to keep in touch with his pit during the long grind, it was announced here today.

The car, a small one of popular make, but rebuilt for racing purposes, was designed and entered in the race by Louis and Arthur Chevrolet, of this city. Louis Chevrolet designed and built the winning cars in the 1920 and 1921 races.

Pointing out that drivers and mechanics lose track of their standing in the long race after they have gone several laps, the Chevrolet brothers declare the wireless telephone will enable the auto pilot to keep in constant touch with his pit and know at all

times his place and other valuable information.

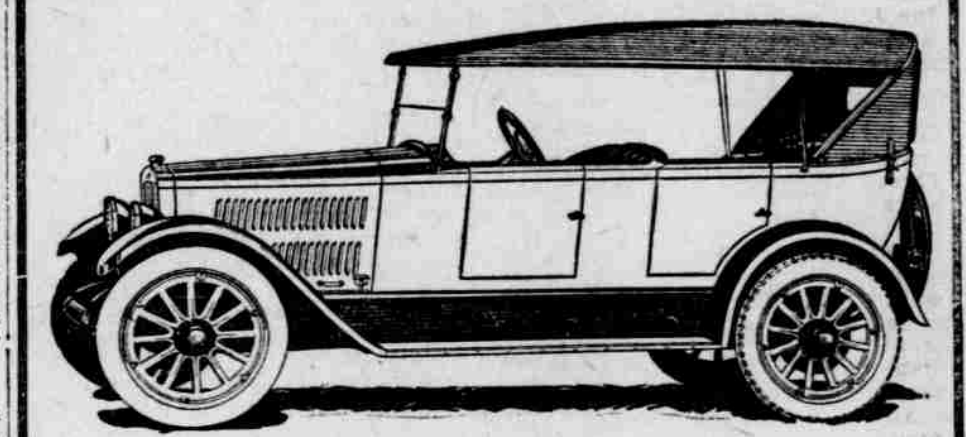
