

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS IN EVERY COUNTY IN SIXTH

LAFAYETTE, Ind., May 10.—An interesting feature of the Wednesday morning session of the convention was the reports of the organization department of which Mrs. E. A. Gould, third vice president, is chairman. In her brief introduction of the district chairman, Mrs. Gould called attention to the big achievement of the league for the year which had been accomplished by the co-operation of all departments working together for the passage of constitutional amendment No. 1, which made it necessary for all voters of Indiana to be citizens of the United States.

"One year ago," said Mrs. Gould, "our convention pledged itself to this accomplishment. Today we meet to report how it has been done and to congratulate both ourselves and the state that we have been able to do our part towards one of the greatest single achievements for citizenship made by Indiana since 1851 when the constitution was adopted. I would class the extension of the vote to women as another achievement of great value and would like to call your attention to the fact that this one amendment provided both things, and had the federal suffrage amendment not been promulgated the year before, this amendment No. 1 would have accomplished that purpose also."

Mrs. Gould then called attention to the goal set by the National for all state organization departments of at least one strong league in each congressional district with the recommendation that when that was accomplished they should try to secure a strong league in each county. The reports which followed showed much more than the National standard reached by Indiana because each district showed from four to eight counties organized and in many counties four and five leagues. The chairmen for the thirteen districts are: 1st, Mrs. Edward Kieffer, Evansville; 2nd, Mrs. Chester Evans, Bloomington; 4th, Mrs. H. O. Long, North Vernon; 5th, Mrs. A. S. Brown, Clay City; 6th, Mrs. Christian Eby, Connersville; 7th, Mrs. Isaac Born, Indianapolis; 8th, Mrs. Ella B. Kehrer, Anderson; 9th, Mrs. John Roush, Frankfort; 10th, Mrs. Ora Thompson Ross, Rensselaer; 11th, Mrs. E. A. Gould, Peru; 12th, Mrs. Maude Murray, Helmer; 13th, Mrs. J. J. Littrell, Elkhart.

RECALL OLD CASE INVOLVING BROWN

GREENVILLE, Ohio, May 10.—The case of the People's Savings Bank of Greenville, against County Treasurer Dan Brown, whereby the bank is asking that the treasurer be compelled to equalize the active funds of the county between the five Greenville banks, was again called up in common pleas court Tuesday before Judge Tarbell of Georgetown, Ohio, who has been called here to preside.

The case of Martin Holmes, charged and convicted in Mayor Fitzgerald's court of the unlawful sale of liquor, and fined \$300 and costs, which case was appealed to the common pleas court, was heard on error by Judge R. L. Singer Tuesday afternoon and taken under advisement.

Poincare Calls Parley
"Moving Picture Show"

PARIS, May 10.—Premier Poincare was quoted, before he took up the reins of government, as characterizing the conference of the supreme council as a "moving picture show." He announced when he took office that he

disapproved of this sort of traveling caravan of allied statesmen around Europe.

He was obviously ill at ease on the occasion of Prime Minister Lloyd George's flying stop in Paris on the way to Genoa to find himself cornered with Lloyd George in the compartment of a sleeping car with no curtains to shut out the gaze of the indiscreet, no way of escape and dozens of cameras leveled at him through the window.

He gave unmistakable signs of relief when the train pulled out and gave little chance to photographers or reporters. He jumped to the platform and strode rapidly to his automobile.

Soviet and Turks to

Sign New Trade Pact

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 10.—The Russian soviet government and the Turkish nationalists are planning to hold a conference at Kars to draw up a new treaty providing for the resumption of commercial relations between Turkey and the small republics of the Caucasus, such as Georgia and Azerbaijan.

A treaty to that effect was signed by the Russians and Turkish nationalists last fall, but has not been ratified by the states concerned on the ground that it was unworkable owing to the abnormal conditions in Russia.

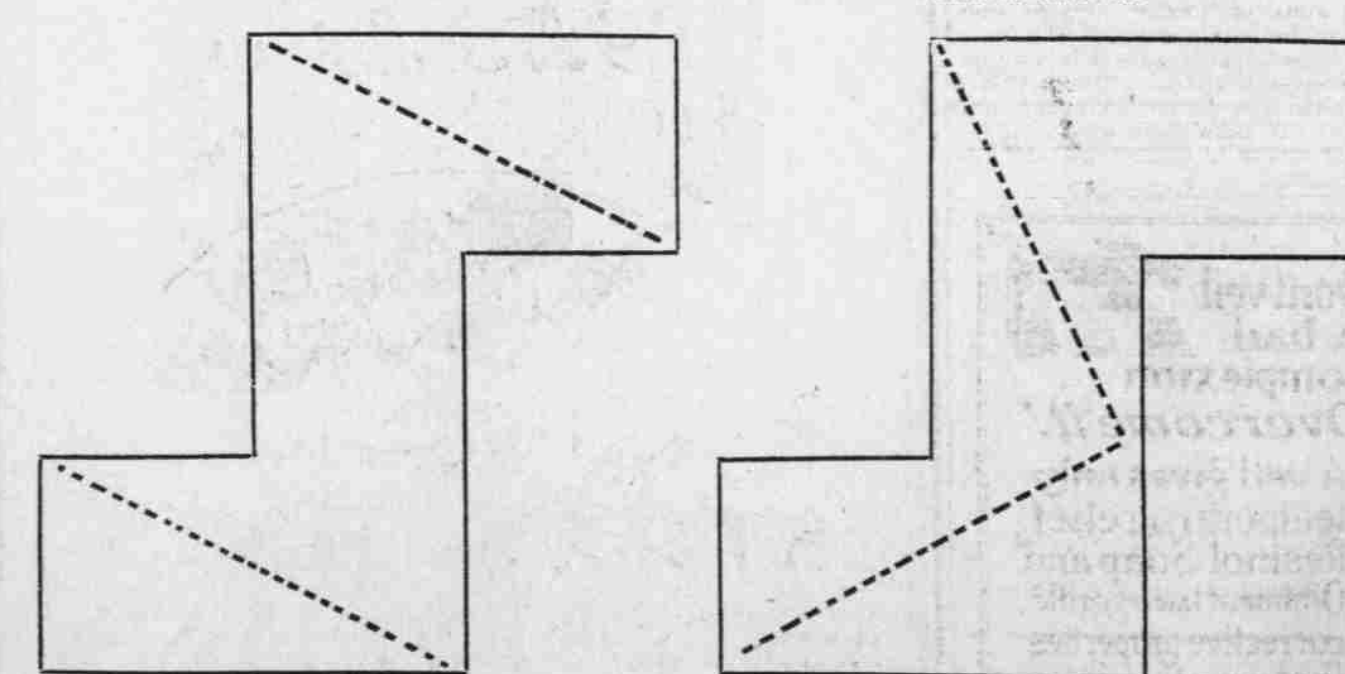
