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## CRUEL AND INHUMAN TREATMENT CLAIMED BY EATON RESIDENT

EATON, Ohio, May 16.—Alleging he struck her and grossly neglected her, Alma Tamplin has entered suit in common pleas court against Earl Tamplin for divorce, temporary and permanent alimony and custody of their children, Ruth, 10 and Robert, 5. In the absence of Common Pleas Judge A. C. Risinger, Probate Judge B. A. Landis issued a restraining order against Tamplin interfering with his wife or the children. The couple married in April, 1908, in West Manchester.

In a supplemental petition to a divorce petition she filed recently in common pleas court, Mary Pearson asks for a restraining order, which was granted by Judge Landis, in the absence of Common Pleas Judge A.
