

HOME MISSION FUNDS GIVEN TO SOUTHERN CHURCH BEATS MARK

CHARLESTON, W.Va., May 19.—Records of 56 years were broken in the contributions of the last year to Southern Presbyterian Home Missions. Receipts, which amounted to \$543,481, were the largest in the history of the executive committee of home missions, according to the report of the committee to the Southern Presbyterian General Assembly here. The amount exceeded that received the year previous by \$76,594.

Special attention was called to the fact that Oklahoma, said to be the weakest synod in the assembly, and largely dependent upon home mission funds for carrying on its home mission work, with 56 congregations which have received church erection aid, leads the church in candidates for the ministry in proportion to membership and ministers at work.

During the year the committee aided 35 ordained negro ministers. It maintains a theological seminary for negro ministers at Tuscaloosa, Ala., a college for Indians at Durant, Okla., and a hospital and orphanage in connection with Highland school at Querrant, Ky., and 47 schools elsewhere. It supports in whole or part, besides its negro missionaries mentioned above, 905 home missionaries, including 271 unsalaried wives of missionaries.

NEW CORN VARIETY FOILS CHINCH BUGS

Chinch bugs may be foiled on at least one farm in Wayne county this summer, as a new variety of corn, guaranteed to break the oldest chinch bug's teeth, has been imported especially for their entertainment.

The county agent is just in receipt of sufficient Democrat corn to plant an acre of ground. The corn, grown in southern Illinois, attained especial fame last summer when it passed practically unharmed through chinch infestation that ruined field after field planted with other varieties.

The peculiar quality that makes the corn repugnant to the bugs is not definitely known, but may be either the greater hardness of the stalk, which makes it difficult to penetrate, or a different flavor of the juice. It is not absolutely inedible to the bugs, but they will pass it by so long as anything else offers.

The corn, sent by Purdue, will be planted on a farm in Wayne county and its performance watched during the next season.
