

## RADIO BROADCASTING IS GODSEND TO BLIND, SAYS SIGHTLESS MAN

(By Associated Press)  
SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 24.—Radio and the broadcasting of news and concert music through the air, was declared here today to be a God send to blind persons by Charles E. Comstock, sightless from infancy, who heads the division for the visitation of adult blind, connected with the State Department of Public Welfare.

"The use of radio equipment by blind persons," Mr. Comstock said, "is undoubtedly the greatest blessing and comfort occurring to this era." He declared that this new invention makes it possible for sightless persons to receive news daily without having it read to them; that the State now has paid readers at the School for the Blind at Jacksonville and the Industrial Home for the Blind in Chicago.

"With the installation of radio equipment," Mr. Comstock said, "their services can be dispensed with. And not only can the blind man now have the advantage of current news, but he can listen to concerts and lectures. I have already equipped my home with radio and am receiving news directly from a central station in Chicago which makes a specialty of sending out bulletins for blind persons. For the past several evenings I have been listening to concerts given in Detroit."

Use of radio in the State School at Jacksonville and the Industrial Home in Chicago, is being contemplated, according to announcement by Judge C. H. Jenkins, director of the state department of Public welfare.

DES MOINES, Ia., May 24.—The Presbyterian Board of Publication and Sabbath school work plans a national organization to be known as the Associated Presbyterian Boys' clubs. Dr. Harold McA. Robinson of Philadelphia, Pa., secretary of the board, reported today to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States. The purpose of the proposed organization, he said, is to "unify the boys' work of the church." Each club is to undertake some definite form of Christian service.

"There has been 100 percent increase in the number of daily vacation Bible schools," Dr. Robinson reported. "Eight hundred being conducted by Presbyterian churches, teaching 100,000 children. Sunday schools have contributed \$179,021 for pioneer work, an increase of \$4,000 over the previous year. Sunday school missionaries report 235 new Sunday schools established and 310 revived."

The board's workers gave away 17,000,000 pages of printed matter, in addition to 7,932 Bibles and Testaments. Two hundred and fifty-seven teacher training classes were organized, making the total number 370 with 3,164 members. The board sustains 3,132 mission Sunday schools in communities otherwise without any organized Christian influence. Last year the board's workers visited 146,887 families in rural districts where there is no pastoral care.

"Two million Protestant boys and girls between six and eighteen are not enrolled in Sunday school. The board could use to great advantage on its educational staff a director of Christian nurture in the family."
