

## WOMAN CANDIDATE FOR KANSAS OFFICE PREDICTS ELECTION

(By Associated Press)  
TOPEKA, Kas., July 28.—Exercising the inextinguishable right of women to change her mind—Miss Helen Pettigrew no longer admits that defeat dwells within her camp, in the primary election contest for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, on Aug. 1. She is one of seven candidates. "I will be nominated by 30,000 plurality," asserted the young and good looking candidate.

Something of a rude awakening is due staid and Puritanic Kansas, according to Miss Pettigrew's prediction. For the main plank in her platform is "the return of beer and light wines." Of course, she admits, she does not intend to put this over single handed. She recognizes that, at the moment, the issue of staging a comeback for beer and light wines would necessarily be national rather than state.

"But I want to show up the sentiment—right here in Kansas, where prohibition has prevailed for more than forty years," Miss Pettigrew declared. "I guess with my nomination then congress will recognize the demand to give the people what they want, surely exists even in greater strength, in other states."

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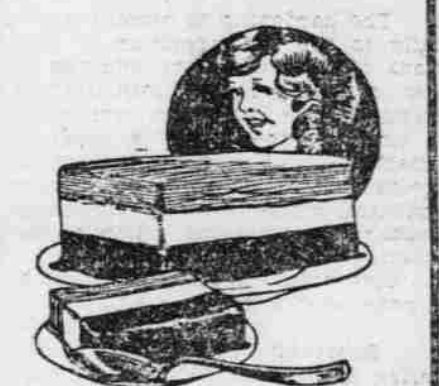
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
