

REPUBLICANS TO OPEN CAMPAIGN IN SIXTH WITH DISTRICT RALLY

The Republican campaign in the 10th congressional district probably will be opened with a district rally to be held in Richmond about the middle of September, according to George A. Elliott of Newcastle, district chairman, who was in Richmond Thursday night to attend an organization meeting of members of the Wayne County Republican central committee. "I am hoping that both Senator Watson and Mr. Beveridge will address the district meeting in Richmond," Mr. Elliott said. "I have received word from Senator Watson that he will deliver at least two speeches in the sixth district during the fall campaign, and that he might find it possible to address four meetings. Mr. Beveridge expects to address several sixth district meetings."

Mrs. A. W. Roach, an active party worker, was elected vice chairman of the Republican county committee at the meeting Thursday evening. Miss Esther Griffin White also was nominated for the position. As vice chairman, Mrs. Roach will have charge of the women's activities during the fall campaign.

Several Addresses

Following the election of a vice chairman the party workers were addressed by Rep. Richard N. Elliott, district chairman George Elliott, and Judge David Meyers, of Decatur county. Chairman Elliott urged the precinct committeemen to begin work immediately on the taking of the ninety-five poll. He said the state committee was anxious to have a complete poll of the state by August 10. Mr. Elliott also mentioned the fact another registration of voters was required this fall, and that there would be only two registration periods, the first, Sept. 9, last, Oct. 9. He asked the committee members to remind the voters at it would be necessary for them to register if they desired to participate in the November election.
