tinually growing better for the agricultural industry of this country.

Mr. Patterson said the demand for the products of the farm was ever increasing and that it would be a long time before the demand could increase to meet the supply.

Conditions Good. Mr. Patterson declared that our country is in better condition today than ever before. He pointed out that prior to the World war the United States was in possession of only 20 percent of the world's gold supply, that we owed more than \$500,000,000 to foreign countries for their having financed certain of our American enterprises. These debts, he said, had been cancelled by our financiers while the country was yet neutral, and

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by the time of the signing of the armistice foreign countries were in debt to the United States to the extent of \$11,000,000,000.

In 1918 the United States was in possession of 35 percent of the world's gold supply and this has been increased until at the present time we hold 46 1/2 percent of the entire amount of gold the world over.

The farmer wants to know whether or not times are getting better said Mr. Patterson. In answer to this question he gave figures showing the enormous demand and the inadequate supply to meet these demands.

Production Short. He stated that in proportion to the past ratio, the country is now one million hogs short on hog production and that there is at the present time only one hog for every 12 people in the world and that there is but one sheep and one head of cattle for every five people in the world. The pork consumption, he said, is 18 per cent greater among the people of the United States than it was last year and that beef consumption is about 14 per cent less. This, he said, indicates prosperity to the pork raisers in this territory.

With the coming of readjustments in the market and the future development of the co-operative work now going on between farmers, the troubles of the farmer will soon be over, Mr. Patterson said.

**Gov. McRae Has Lead In Arkansas Primary**  
(By Associated Press)

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 9.—Governor T. C. McRae, candidate for the gubernatorial re-nomination regarded in Arkansas as equivalent to election, held a lead of more than two to one over Judge E. P. Toney when tabulation of the delayed returns from yesterday's state-wide primary was resumed today.

Newspaper tabulation early today, accounting for 259 precincts, approximately one-fifth of the voting places in the state, gave McRae 16,257 votes and Toney, 6,519.

Representative W. A. Oldfield, Democratic "whip" in congress, the only member of the Arkansas congressional delegation having opposition for re-nomination, had a lead of approximately 2 1/2 to 1 over W. A. Hodges of Bald Knob, on returns from about one-fifth of the precincts in the second congressional district.

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**Kaiser Wins Suit Stopping Stage Play "The Dismissal"**

BERLIN, Aug. 9.—Former Emperor William has won his suit, brought in a Berlin court, to prohibit the presentation on the stage or the sale of Emil Ludwig's Bismarckian play, "The Dismissal."

William was joined in the suit by Frau Von Boetticher, widow of the minister of state of Bismarck's time. The court decided that the plaintiff had a right to object to a stage performance or book portraying them personally.
