POSTOFFICE BUSINESS IS GOOD IN AUGUST

"August was a good month for the Richmond postoffice this year," said Henry Deuker, assistant postmaster, Friday. "August is usually a dead month in point of sales and receipts but this year it turned out better than we expected."

Mr. Deuker stated that the sale of treasury savings certificates for the month of August were \$7,768 while the sale of documentary stamps amounted to \$622, an increase over July of \$37.50. The postal receipts for the months of June, July and August were \$43,635.10, an increase over the same period in 1920 of \$7,337.34 and that of 1921, of \$1,581.73.

Mr. Deuker remarked upon the excellent salubility of the treasury savings certificates and stated that the people of this county were fully realizing the benefits accruing from this sort of saving.

The three rail heads against whom the alleged plot was made were said to be the presidents of the New York Central lines, the Pennsylvania system, and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific. The home here of the ringleader was said to be under surveillance and his arrest was expected.

May Deport Aliens.
Deportation proceedings against aliens arrested in connection with plots against the railroads are probable authorities said.

Governor Small of Illinois granted a requisition to extradite William Z. Foster, radical leader and head of the Trade Union Educational league to Michigan, where he is wanted on charges of criminal syndicalism growing out of the alleged communist meeting in the past 24 hours were these: W. P. Seyfried, president of the New Mexico state federation of labor, and Anselmo Bruno, a plumber, were presented at Albuquerque following their arrest on a Santa Fe train and the discovery of bombs, fuses and caps in their grips. Searching Seyfried's room police said they found more bombs.

Road officials said they believed Seyfried and Bruno planned to blow up the Raton tunnel. The officers said they had information of plans to dynamite a bank building and hotel under consideration by non-union labor at Albuquerque.

Several bridges on the St. Louis Southwestern railway in Arkansas and Texas, were burned and telephone wires were cut. The road offered a reward of \$1,000 for the arrest of persons responsible for the fires.

Track walkers discovered a loose rail near the junction of the Cotton Belt and the Missouri Pacific at North Little Rock, Ark. Spikes had been pulled from the ties.

Bridge burners fired a Sante Fe trestle near Tecumseh, Okla., after saturating it with kerosene. Poses were in pursuit of three men said to have started the fire.

Homes of three employees of the Illinois Central at Paducah, Ky., were dynamited. The explosions occurred in different parts of the city.

Five men, including the chairman of the two striking shopcrafts were arrested at Slater, Mo., by Deputy United States marshals and taken to Kansas City, charged with interfering with the mails. The charges include the alleged beating of a volunteer fireman on the Chicago & Alton, who was dragged from an engine cab by a mob at Marshall, Md.

Other developments included threats against railroad officials at Memphis, Tenn., the dynamiting of a Pennsylvania railroad bridge at Wilmington, Del., a clash between a striking shopman and workers at LaCrosse, Wis., and the slugging of a Missouri Pacific ship foreman at Sedalia, Mo.

PRISON INMATES INCREASE
COLUMBUS, Ohio, Sept. 1.—The population at the Ohio State penitentiary still is on the upgrade, according to a statement from Warden P. E. Thomas. During August, 1921, penitentiary prisoners numbered 2,380; this year for that month, there were 2,648 registered, an increase of 268, exclusive of those paroled, Thomas said.

CONGRESSMAN BUYS AIRPLANES
AMERICUS, Ga., Sept. 1.—Congressman Manuel Herrick of Oklahoma, purchased 28 airplanes at a government sale at Southfield yesterday. Mr. Herrick said he intended to use the planes for "political purposes" in Oklahoma and other states.

CAPE GIRIDA, Mo., Sept. 1.—Two persons were killed and several injured today when a St. Louis and San Francisco passenger train en route to Memphis from St. Louis, was wrecked near here, when a trestle it was crossing gave way.

CRAWFORDSVILLE, Ind., Sept. 1.—Ray Jolley, 25 years old, guard on the Big Four railroad, was found dead beside the tracks of the railroad here today. His body had been severed by a freight train. Bruises and cuts

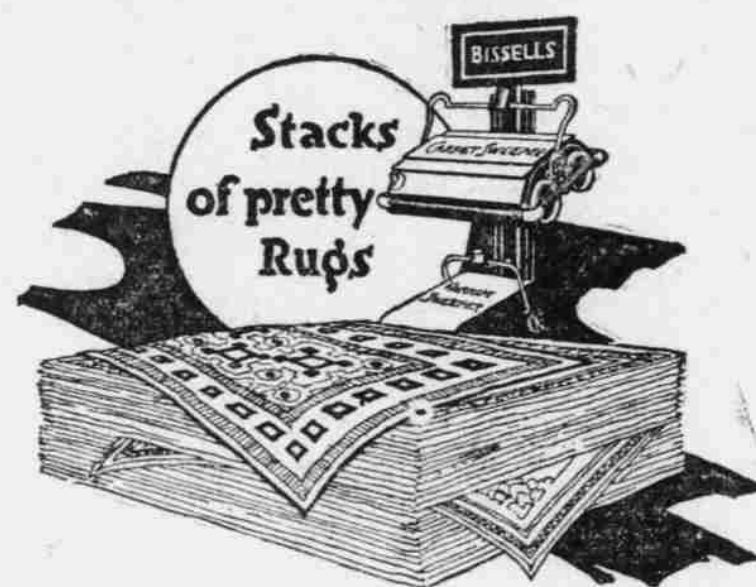
