

## YOUNG VENETIAN GIRL FINDS HIDDEN SPRINGS BY NATURAL POWERS

(By Associated Press)

ROME, Oct. 7.—Augusta Del Luogo, a beautiful young girl of Venice, is looking to a period of profitable and pleasant employment. Italy is particularly interested in her now in two things, the location of petroleum, for all the world wants oil, and finding of water, for the drought of the past two summers is said to be the beginning of a long dry spell. To Augusta Del Luogo is ascribed the ability to locate the deposit, within the earth, of both oil and water, and her successes have been so remarkable that her services are being sought by companies interested in oil production and irrigation. Augusta first noticed her ability when a child. When walking in the country she would notice little shocks passing from her feet to her head, causing her distinct pain. In 1909, she met a famous water diviner, Chialbrera, and found that his divining rod acted as well for her as it did for him. A year later she went to Argentina and, using use of her powers, indicated a number of places where water would be found, sometimes at a depth of 600 feet. In each case water was found but in some instances it turned out to be salt.

Back in Italy, after the war Augusta, in the presence of two engineers, has located not only water, but petroleum and deposits of pyrites. She no longer uses the divining rod, but a chronometer. It is said that thus equipped she can tell with remarkable accuracy the depth at which the water will be discovered, and whether it is scanty or abundant.

In connection with the electric service. It has been reported here that each of the three appraisers are convinced that the electric utility is worth at least as much as the other made by the Interstate company, and no one will be surprised if the appraisers' report fixes a higher valuation. The appraisers, it is understood, have discovered that the bookkeeping system at the local plant does not separate the accounts of the electric service and the water service and this has handicapped them considerably in determining the valuation of the electric utility.

Serves 611 Consumers.  
The electric plant serves 611 consumers, but the two largest power consumers in the town obtain their current from the Connersville company. Experts believe that the acquisition of the local municipal electric utility would be a profitable investment for the Interstate company. It would continue to serve the two largest consumers, now obtaining current from its Connersville plant, it would serve all the other consumers in the town, and the town itself would be compensated.
