

## MASTERLY RENDITIONS OF ORGANIST HEARD BY LARGE AUDIENCE

Dr. Minor C. Baldwin, of New York City, furnished one of the musical treats of the season in the pipe organ recital he gave Wednesday evening at the Church of St. Mary. The largest audience which has gathered for an organ recital in recent years greeted the venerable musician, who has played over the entire civilized world, twice been official organist for world fairs, and is a member of the Royal Music Society of London.

There is imagination in Dr. Baldwin's playing and technical facility in his renditions. He plays apparently with absolute mastery of every resource of his art—an art that truly conceals art. He played with force at times but never went beyond the limit of beauty in musical tone.

The program was one pleasing to everyone and gave the artist an opportunity to display his abilities and versatility. In the first number, Bach's "Toccata and Fugue" was speeded but did not belittle the clearness and distinct articulation. Dr. Baldwin's own compositions, "At Evening" and "Bridal Song," were two of the most delightful numbers on the program and were executed with feeling. Fine shades of tone gradation marked his rendition of Reinhold's dramatic "Intermezzo."

### Encore Demanded

Variations were introduced in the "Lullaby," Godard. An organ arrangement of "Adeste Fideles," one of the final numbers was beautifully played. The church was darkened near the close of the program and the organist played "The Storm," depicting terrific thunder, rainfall, and lightning flashes. The "Pilgrim" from Tannhäuser, which was announced as the last number on the program was followed by "The Rosary," played with delightful variations. Another encore was demanded by the audience before it would leave.

The organist was assisted in his program by Samuel B. Garton, who sang the lovely "Ave Maria" by Bach, a selected number and an encore. Mrs. Harley Porterfield accompanied him.

Henry H. Historical Society—WILL EMPLOY CURATOR

NEWCASTLE, Ind., Oct. 27.—A regular curator will be employed by the Henry county historical society at a salary of \$720 a year, according to action taken at the semi-annual meeting at the organization home in Newcastle Thursday. Attendance at the meeting was greater than at any previous session.

Richmond's rural route system is in the best of condition, according to Clarence Foreman, superintendent of mail, who has just completed his semi-annual inspection. The four routes covered by the local postoffice's rural carriers total more than 200 miles, and are traveled each day the trip ending about noon.

Mr. Foreman said that with a few exceptions the letter boxes along the roads are in good condition. But he urges all farmers to pay strict attention to their mail boxes to see that they are kept in the best shape. He advises owners of such boxes to inspect them and to make any needed repairs such as seeing that the box is firmly in the ground; that the approach to the box is such that the carriers will be able to drive close to the boxes without getting stuck in a rut when the ground becomes soft; that both post and box is painted to improve appearance and durability.

"I don't believe I ever saw the country look prettier than it does now," Mr. Foreman remarked. "It is just beautiful."
