

VOTING PRECINCTS AT EATON NAMED; CAMPAIGNS CLOSED

EATON, Ohio, Nov. 6.—Eaton will have six voting precincts in the election Tuesday instead of four, as heretofore. Cherry street, will as heretofore, divide the precincts north and south. Precincts one, three and five are on the west side of Cherry street, and precincts two, four and six are on the east side. The precincts are numbered from the south on either side.

Main street, south side, is the north boundary line of precinct one and two. Main street, north side, is the south boundary line of precincts three and four. The Pennsylvania railway track is the north boundary line of the fourth precinct. Precinct five extends from the north side of the railroad to the corporation line. The sixth precinct extends from Bruce street, north side, to the corporation line.

Council has designated the voting places in the six precincts as follows: First precinct, Anderson Motor company, South Barron street; second precinct, Stoller building, East Main street, next door to Christmas's hardware store; third precinct, council chamber; fourth precinct, Hiestand and company planing mill, High and Maple streets; fifth precinct, A. H. Weir building, Barron and Monfort streets, block north of railroad; sixth precinct, U. B. church basement.

Democrats and Republicans of Preble county held the last mass meetings of the campaign here Saturday. The Democrats held their meeting in the afternoon in their headquarters. The Republican meeting was held at night in the opera house. The attendance at both meetings was big and enthusiastic.

Judge Warren Gard, Democratic candidate for congress from this district, addressed the Democratic meeting, as also did Judge Kretzer and Mrs. Schaeffer, of Dayton, and Mrs. Roache, of Hamilton.

Congressman Roy C. Fitzgerald, Republican candidate for re-election from this district, and Congressman Stephen G. Porter, of Pennsylvania, chairman of the house foreign affairs committee, were the speakers at the Republican meeting.

With the campaign closed in the county, both sides are confident on the eve of the election that their respective tickets will be successful. Logan L. Brown, chairman of the county Democratic committee, and John M. Wehrly, chairman of the county Republican committee, stated they are pleased with the situation and the outlook. Each believes his party will be victorious.

PREBLE FARM BUREAU AIDS LIVESTOCK FIRMS

EATON, Ohio, Nov. 6.—An appropriation of \$400 from the county treasury to assist in the establishment of producers' livestock commission companies at Buffalo, Cleveland and Pittsburg, and later at Cincinnati, was made by the Preble county farm bureau directors at their regular monthly meeting in the courthouse Saturday afternoon. The directors also considered the annual dues collection and membership campaign and heard a report from Herbert Brown of Gratiot, director of the Miami Valley Milk Producers co-operative association, on the affairs of that organization.

Great satisfaction was expressed with the results obtained through co-operative livestock shipment of local association. Darke county producers having shipped for some time, while a Preble county co-operative shipping association has shipped enough to demonstrate its value, according to its patrons. The latter co-operative has headquarters at Eldorado and ships principally from the north end of Preble county.

A business amounting to a third of a million dollars was reported by the milk producers co-operative association director. Territory around Springfield and Dayton and smaller western Ohio cities, has been organized, the production of 16,000 cows has been contracted for, he stated.

FRIENDS ENJOY WORK OF SENDING CLOTHING

The following has been submitted: "The Friends' Service Committees of Richmond recently issued a call for clothing to be sent for the relief of the Near East. They asked for warm articles, good for six months' wear. The response was generous and the multitude of garments contributed required many hands to arrange, assort, repair and pack. South Eighth Street Friends took care of their own collection and were the first to make shipment. Last week a group of some 20 women from North A Street, West Richmond, and East Main Street Friends met at North A Street meeting house to look after the supplies of clothing which had been brought there from various sources. Some of the different committees had been working separately before this time repairing. However, there were still patches and buttons to be put on, rents to stitch and breaks to mend, so earnestly and willingly these worthy women worked for a whole day preparing and packing. Most of the clothing sent was in excellent condition. There were numerous suits for men and women, abundance of warm underwear, cloaks, coats and one-piece dresses.

It was a pleasure indeed, to place in with the worn clothing, which had been so carefully repaired, a large contribution of new garments for children, woolen petticoats with waists, 120 of them, made by the Monday club of the West Richmond Friends. Others had donated similar articles, several suits of new underwear and many new pairs of hose. A partial list of donors is as follows: The North A Street Friends, West Richmond Friends, East Main Street Friends, Salem Friends, New Garden Township, Mrs. Hansel's Sunday school class of the Presbyterian church, besides a number of individuals and churches in the city and neighboring towns.

Many Persons Respond
It is not possible to enumerate all who responded to the call for clothing. While packing the boxes, some one called attention to the name printed upon the boxes, "George Fox." What could be more appropriate? The founder of the Society of Friends would understand and approve the spirit which prompted the work. He would also want credit accorded the merchant in our city who so kindly donated the containers. Twenty boxes of clothing and two bags of shoes were filled and sent with the view of their reaching the field by February, when the coldest weather begins. The work of the Friends' Service committee has caused the name to signify the relationship they desire to sustain toward a suffering world, friends of humanity.

The feeling of cordiality between the different branches of Friends has been materially increased since they have engaged together in a common service of love. Strange that work for peoples far away must be the means of emphasizing denominational kinship. Side by side, mending, packing, each with a like purpose, meant warmth of fellowship, hearts aglow with love that binds, love that knows no barrier. Appreciation is herein expressed for all who made the shipment a success and to the men and women of North A Street Friends, who so graciously provided for the comfort and enjoyment of all who assisted in the good work. 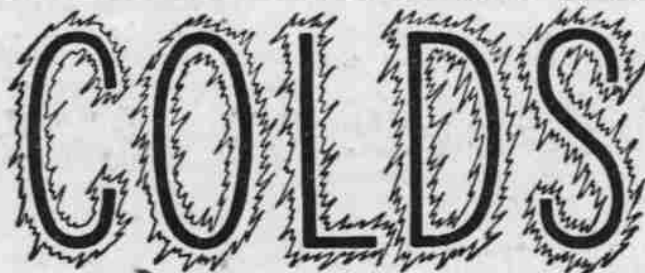
