

EPISCOPAL CHURCH OF MID-WEST SYNOD TO MEET NOV. 13-15

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—The synod of the mid-west of the Protestant Episcopal church will be held in Chicago Nov. 13, 14 and 15. Included in this meeting will be the dioceses of Chicago, Quincy, Springfield, Indiana, Northern Indiana, Ohio, Southern Ohio, Michigan, Western Michigan, Milwaukee and Fond du Lac.
The lower house is composed of four clerical and four lay delegates from each diocese while the provincial synod follows the lines of the general convention. In connection with this meeting will be a House of Church Women meeting composed of women delegates from each of the dioceses and representing the general women's organizations of the church.
The Rev. W. E. Gardner, D.D., general secretary of the department of religious education of the church, will lead a conference on religious education on Tuesday, November 14. Dr. Gardner was responsible for the adoption of the Christian Nurture series in use by most of the schools of the church.

Leader of Conference

The conference on church extension and the nation-wide campaign to be held the same day, will be led by the Rev. W. H. Milton, D.D., general secretary of the nation-wide campaign department.
The Rev. Charles N. Lathrop, formerly at All Saints' Cathedral, Milwaukee, and now general secretary of the department of social service, and the Rev. W. C. Emhardt, of the Americanization department of the church, will have charge of the conference on social service, including rural and Americanization work, to be held Wednesday. Rev. Emhardt has just returned from an investigation of conditions in Palestine and the Near East.
A mass meeting to be held Tuesday evening at St. Paul's church will be addressed by the Rev. F. A. McElwain, D.D., bishop of Minnesota, Dr. Gardner and Dr. Milton.
Sessions of the synod will be held in the Church of the Epiphany and the women delegates will meet in Chase House, adjoining the church.

BIBLE CLASS BANQUET ATTENDED BY 41 MEN

Forty-one men attended the first banquet of the Men's Bible class of the Reid Memorial church held in the lower room of the church at 6:30 o'clock Monday evening. Seated at the tables the men were served with a fine chicken supper after which there were informal talks by members and visitors.
Dr. William Squier gave an interesting account of how he helped to build up a Sunday school class at Princeton, Indiana, and stated that it was his belief that the same principles could be used in building up a similar class here. One of the statements he made was that no one Sunday school class in any city could receive a boom without it having a similar effect on the Sunday school classes of other churches.
Rev. W. McClean Work is teacher for the Bible class, and the officers are: L. P. Melody, president; John Norwich, vice president; Harry Ramsey, secretary, and W. C. Rupe, treasurer.

RADIO NEWS

Palladium Government Call is 9 ZAE—Fred Clark, Operator

A new station to which Richmond fans may listen is announced in the recent improvement of the Ohio State university equipment. The station is now one of the new Class B stations, with a 500-watt output, and a daylight range of 20 to 300 miles. Daily weather and market reports are broadcasted at 1:30 every afternoon on a wavelength of 485 meters. Reports are supplied by the Ohio Bureau of Markets. The station began operation Nov. 6.

Originally started to compel observance of naval radio laws which provide for radio equipment on every ship carrying 50 or more persons, the government radio service has expanded to enormous proportions. It has licensed 3,859 commercial and 15,504 amateur radio stations. Non-amateur stations include 2,773 commercial ships, 1,194 government ships, 575 commercial land, 284 government land and 511 special stations. The nine radio inspection districts are under the supervision of the service also.

Radio Manufacturers.
The Westinghouse East Springfield works in Massachusetts employs 1,000 people, has 80,000 square feet of floor space and ships 1,200 receivers a day. The General Electric company employs 3,000 people in the Schenectady factory and expects soon to expand to a payroll of 5,000 persons.

A jealous watch is being kept on the use of radio for purposes which may harm the science, one of the most threatening being its use for advertising. While no serious danger exists from the larger and reputable companies, it would easily be possible for much annoyance to be caused by the smaller concerns. In many sections, according to an article in Radio Broadcast, the practice already exists. Many commercial houses, some of which have installed stations, some of which may be heard in Richmond, which are being used for indirect, or in some cases, direct advertising. These stations include firms which have no interest in radio aside from the use of it for advertising other products.

Canadian Broadcast Control.
An interesting feature of Canadian radio is the fact that associations, such as for instance as the ARRL of the ninth district here, may issue amateur broadcast licenses, and have full control of the broadcasting. Fees may be charged and the association has power to withdraw the license. This gives closer control of the stations than an overheard national organization. A wavelength of 250 meters is assigned for such licenses.

Chicago Station.
The station WMAQ, operated by the Daily News, is coming through well in Ohio, according to recent reports. Even as far as Maryland, one listener reports that he heard whistles, even heard the operator breathe, and complains about the loud ticking of the operator's Ingersoll watch. England Opens the Gate.
Amateurs will be permitted to broadcast in England, according to recent announcement. Formerly all broadcasts have been limited to government and postal stations, and a few specially licensed amateurs. A small fee is to be charged and broadcasting limited to between 5 and 11 o'clock in the evening with no limitation on Sundays. Restrictions also are to be taken of possession of receiving apparatus, but it must be of British manufacture for two years yet.

Sharing the Ether.

Pyle of the Precision Equipment company in a recent article. On a tour on which a receiving set was carried and checked with sets owned by various novices, it was found, he says, that most people expected too much from their sets.
