

61 EATON PERSONS DIE DURING 1922; BIRTHS TOTAL 41

EATON, Ohio, Jan. 2.—Sixty-one persons died in Eaton in the year 1922, as compared with 41 births in the year, according to records of City Clerk Robert Fisher, registrar of vital statistics. In 1921 there were 56 deaths and 47 births.

The oldest person dying in Eaton last year was Susan V. Fosdick, at the age of 92. The average age of the 61 passing away was a fraction over 62 years. The combined age of all was a trifle more than 3,791 years. Sixteen persons were in the eighties, 15 in the seventies and 11 in the sixties. Thirty-seven were females and 24 were males.

Eaton Fire Loss in 1922 Estimated Less Than \$500

EATON, Ohio, Jan. 2.—Eaton's total fire loss in 1922 was less than \$500, Fire Chief George Shaver estimates. In 1921 the loss was in the neighborhood of \$75,000. The fire department responded to eight alarms in 1922, as

compared with 12 alarms in 1921, according to records of W. B. Fisher, secretary of the department, which is a volunteer organization. The bulk of the loss in 1921 was represented by a fire that destroyed the Eaton Tire Service company garage in the E. C. Wysong building and consumed 32 automobiles. The date of the fire was Jan. 13.

in the office of Clerk of Courts V. O. Rookstool, as compared with 37 suits in 1921.






