

## BEGIN SECOND MUSIC MEMORY CONTEST IN RICHMOND TODAY

The second Music Memory contest held by Richmond Community Service began Monday and the final examination will be held during the week of March 19. The prizes will be awarded those who score the greatest number of points.

The purpose of the contest is generally known. It is held to familiarize the citizens of a community with good music and to make the knowledge of love and good music more widespread. Twenty-four selections have been made.

Any person in Richmond and the surrounding community may enter the contest. Each person may win one individual prize only, but may compete in as many different classes as desired. Invitations have been sent to the city churches, Sunday schools, public schools, parochial schools, parent-teachers' associations, so that all may participate. It is expected that the interest this year will be even greater than last year, when Richmond made a record such as has not been surpassed in any other community.

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## LENTEN SEASON WILL BEGIN FEBRUARY 14

Ash Wednesday, which falls this year on Feb. 14 and marks the beginning of the Lenten season, carries the reminder that the best and worst of winter are behind us and springtime approaches. Religiously considered, Ash Wednesday takes its name from the ceremonial use of ashes as a symbol of penitence, which is traced back to the penance of sackcloth and ashes spoken of by Old Testament prophets.

In the Anglican and Lutheran communions, as well as in the Roman Catholic, the Lenten Fast is maintained; and though through the year the period of fasting has frequently varied, by common acceptance among all Christian communities the 40-day period is now observed.

The word Lent is derived from the old Anglo-Saxon word *lenten*, meaning spring, and, as the fast falls in the early part of the year, by common usage Lent now is generally associated with the beginning of spring, which comes to full flower with the Easter festival of the resurrection and the reawakening of life.
