

**PREBLE DEMOCRACY

EATON, O., Feb. 7.—State Agricultural Director Charles V. Truax is an assured speaker for the Jackson day banquet to be staged here Thursday night in the state armory by the Democracy of Preble county, the banquet speakers' committee announces. Mason Douglass, Dayton attorney, will be a guest and speaker. It is probable they will be the only men to give addresses at the dinner.
