THE MAILS.
An alteration has been made in the arrivals of the mails at this place. The mail now goes up on Wednesdays and Fridays, and comes down on Thursdays and Saturdays.

This arrangement has put us to some inconvenience in mailing our papers to go up on Friday, and in our hurry to get them off for the last two weeks, we have left a number of typographical errors uncorrected. This will account for these mistakes. We will, hereafter, endeavor to be more correct.

We have not received the proceedings of the County Convention, which met at Manchester, on Monday last. We are informed, however, that Col. ABEL C. PEPPER, Col. PINKNEY JAMES, Major JOHN P. DUNN, and DAVID GUARD, Esq. were nominated as candidates to be supported by those friendly to a division of the county.

In reply to numerous inquiries, we will state, that we are informed it is Col. PEPPER's intention shortly to resign his Indian Agency.

TO MECHANICS.
A number of Journeymen Mechanics, such as Tailors, Saddlers, Shoemakers, &c. are wanted in this village. "Sober and industrious men, can find constant employment and liberal wages. None others need apply." Laboring men are also wanted.

It gives us pleasure to state that the individuals who were so seriously injured at the saw-mill, in this village, on Friday of last week, are rapidly recovering. Mr. Spoor, (who was supposed to be dangerous,) is now thought to be out of danger.

We stated a few weeks since that the Supreme Court of this state convened at Indianapolis, on the first Monday in this month. This was a mistake. We did not know that the statute of 1831, had been amended. The court meets on the last Monday in May.

A citizen of this place, who came passenger in the steam boat *Champion*, from Natchez to Louisville, on her first trip up, informs us that there is no truth in the paragraph we last week copied from the *Louisville Advertiser*, stating that the *Champion* had been beaten by the *Chancellor*. We deem our duty to make this correction. The Editor of the *Advertiser* must have been misinformed.

TEXAS.
We have given some extracts to-day, going to confirm more strongly the reported capture of the "Mexican Butcher," (as he has been appropriately styled) Santa Anna. We have not the least doubt but that General Houston has him safe enough. The several accounts, received from different quarters, all go to confirm the first report of his capture. It will be seen that general Cos was killed in the battle.

On Tuesday morning last, the steam-boat *Pittsburgh*, bound up, was run into by the *Orion* coming down, at the mouth of Laughery, about six miles above this place. The *Pittsburgh* sunk in a few minutes, and her guards are now under water. We are informed that she is considerably injured, but to what amount we are unable to say.

The Cincinnati Gazette of the 25th inst., contradicts the account of the inhuman massacre, by the Mexicans, of Dr. Benj. Harrison, son of Gen. Harrison. The editor of the Gazette has seen a letter from Dr. Harrison himself, dated on the 25th of April, from which it seems that he was taken prisoner with other Texans by the Mexicans—afterwards surrendered himself to a Mexican officer, who, in consideration of an acquaintance with the character of his father, sent him, in company with guides to the Texian camp, but somehow or other, the Texans saw proper to arrest him as a spy of the Mexicans; and he is now, instead of being most brutally butchered, a prisoner of the Texans. Such, says the Gazette, is Dr. Harrison's narration.

THE MARKETS.
The Cincinnati Gazette of Thursday last, says Flour has declined in that city to four dollars and fifty cents per barrel. This is coming down to something like the real value of the article. In New Orleans, May 11, our latest date, Flour was selling at \$6 and \$6, 12 1-2. Bacon in Cincinnati, according to the Gazette, is "very difficult to obtain purchasers, varying in price from 7 1-2 to 3 1-2 cents." Here we are paying 12 1-2 cents.

The Editor of the *Liberty Star* AND *Union county Banner*, don't seem to relish the suggestion we made in the alteration of his head, (not his editorial head, for that would be hard to alter, but the head or title of his newspaper.) He says he has committed his "imp" on the subject, and the said *imp* decides that "it would not be in accordance with mechanical skill or even good taste," to make the alteration. We thought about as much. It seems that this Editor's *imp* knows more than his master; but neither of them know too much about the Art of Printing. Now, Mr. Cornelius Vanaunder Duggins, how do you like that?

A friend has placed in our hands a copy of a hand-bill, headed "Fellow citizens of Dearborn County," signed "Milton Gregg," and dated "Miller township, July 29th, 1835," from which we intend shortly to give some extracts, for the edification of the said Milton Gregg. It will place his professions and his practice in delightful juxtaposition.

It was with some difficulty that we procured this copy. They are very scarce in this end of the county, although there was a large bundle of them sent here. It may be, that after Gregg was elected, he sent out orders to have them destroyed.

At a respectable meeting of the citizens of Union township, favorable to a division, held at the House of Col. James M. Hastings, on Friday, the 20th May, on motion, JOSEPH WOODS, Esq. was appointed president, and JAMES MURRAY, secretary. The object of the meeting having been explained, the following resolutions were offered and adopted:

Resolved, That Joseph Woods, Esq. Amos T. Coyle, William Kittle, Martin Scranton, William How, John K. Lewis, John Downey, Jacob Culp, William Gerard, Dr. Robert Gillespie, James Murray, and James M. Hastings, be appointed delegates to attend the county convention, to be held at the House of O. Heustis, Esq. in Manchester, on the 4th Monday in May, to select candidates favorable to a division of Dearborn county.

Resolved, That we will use all honorable means to promote the election of the candidates selected by the county convention.

Resolved, That the Editors of the *Rising Sun Times*, and *Indiana Palladium*, be requested to publish the proceedings of this meeting.

Resolved, That this meeting now adjourn.

Resolved, That the proceedings of this meeting be published in the *Rising Sun Times*, and in the *Indiana Palladium*.
