Proposed Drainage Canal.

Starke County Republican:

The proposition of diverting the waters of the Kankakee through a canal into the Tippecanoe river is again receiving the attention of the government. Two civil engineers, Messrs. Johnson and Hanna, were here Monday looking over county maps and consulting local engineers. It is quite likely that if the plan is put into execution the Kankakee will be tapped at the south end of English lake. The shortest line to the Tippecanoe river, a point in Franklin township, Pulaski county, is twenty miles in length, but it is probable that the canal would be constructed south and connected with Monon creek which discharges its waters into the Tippecanoe six miles north of Monticello, White county. Between English lake and the mouth of Monon creek the distance is about thirty-five miles. As has been mentioned before in these columns, the object of this canal is twofold, to give the Kankakee valley better drainage and to furnish better water power on the Tippecanoe.

Rev. J. W. Cain, of the Grace M. E. church, at Hartford City, sprang a surprise on his congregation Sunday morning and as a result the male members are thinking of extending him a vote of thanks and probably more. The Mitchell Powder A Great Invention.

Editor Charles E. Newton, Of the Monticello Evening Journal, with George Palmer and James Mitchell, of that place, and Frank Bending, of Brookston, all members of the Tippecanoe powder Company, were in the city today for the purpose of testing and demonstrating the qualities of their invention as a blasting force. Several charges were exploded at the lime kilns north of the city and the result was most satisfactory.

Many different tests have been made with the powder, but this was the first stone test. It has been demonstrated that this powder is more forceful than any other ever manufactured, and besides it is absolutely smokeless. This is a great advantage in blasting, as the fumes from dynamite are very annoying to the men who are compelled to work about it.

Another great advantage is [the fact that it is not necessary to have a dry hole. The charges exploded here today were in holes nearly full of water. The government has given this powder the most severe tests, and when the company is ready to manufacture it on a large scale Uncle Sam will be one of their best customers.

The company is arranging to build a factory at Monticello, but they are waiting for the granting of some additional patents on the invention.

James C. Mitchell, of Reynolds, is the inventor of the powder.

Michaels, foreman of the celebrated "pin brigade" jury, whose testimony against the accused proved damaging at the former trial, has not been found. A summons has been issued for Michael's wife to call at the state's attorney's office to be questioned.
