Small Scores Are Expected in Football Battles Today

Muddy Going on Practically all College Gridirons Promises Lack of Heavy Results—No Strong Contenders in West.

CHICAGO, Oct. 10.—Small scores will probably feature the football games today as the teams will have muddy going on nearly every college ground. None of the strong in the west, however, has a real contender.

Northwestern promises a surprise as the result of new coaches and renewed confidence but outside critics see no change for the purple to defeat Stagg's Maroons. The records show that Northwestern has scored just three points against Chicago in the last 10 years.

If Coach Stagg instructs his players to cut loose with a varied assortment of plays, they will probably roll up a big score.

Coach Murphy of Northwestern will instruct his men to use every play they have been taught since the team has been practicing. The Purple mentor realizes his eleven must make a creditable showing if a successful season is to be experienced in Evans-ton.

Battle for Indiana. Indiana, after its weak showing against Chicago last Saturday, will strive to recover part of its lost laurels by giving battle to the strong Illinois eleven at Urbana. In its game with Christian Brothers college of St. Louis last Saturday, the Orange and Blue aggregation gave evidence of its strength. That Coach Sukkah has the material to develop a team which will be a contender for the conference title is admitted. As the team should show vast improvement Indiana will have to fight every minute of play to escape another decisive beating.

Marquette, which was beaten last Saturday by a small university team should prove easy prey for Wisconsin at Madison. This game will give Coach Jurena his last opportunity to try out all his candidates before Purdue is met next Saturday in a game of great importance to both institutions. Purdue will go into action for the second time this season by meeting Western Reserve at Lafayette. As the boiler-makers showed plenty of offensive and defensive strength against Babash last Saturday, they should be the victors in today's struggle by a comfortable margin.

Michigan will tackle its old foe, Vanderbilt, at Ann Arbor. Because of the improvement by which the Wolverines have shown with the playing of each succeeding game a warm contest is looked for.

CRACK PLAYERS OUT OF CONTEST

Notre Dame to Take Field With Four Stars Out of Lineup, But Rooters Expect Victory Over Rose Poly.

With four regulars out of the lineup when the whistle blows, Notre Dame will clash with Rose Poly on Cartier field this afternoon in the final home game before the battle with Yale at New Haven, Conn., next week.

Eichenlaub, Lathrop, Keefe and Bachman will be out of the game at the start because of injuries. Eichenlaub is still in bad shape, and will hardly get into the game before the Yale contest.

Duggan, who starred in the Alma game, will be at fullback in place of Eichenlaub. Holmes or Sharp will fill in the vacancy at right tackle, caused by Lathrop's injury and Ward and Stephan will be at the guards in place of Bachman and Keefe.

Coach Harper is not going to take any chances with his crippled and it is possible that none of the four men will be used at any time during the Rose game.

Capt. Jones and Pineson will make their first public appearance of the season, when they will play at their old positions of left tackle and left half back, respectively. Both men were kept out of last Saturday's game because of injuries.

Lighter practice was in vogue at Cartier field yesterday. The men were given a fast workout, but it was nothing in comparison with what they underwent Thursday. There was no scrimmage, signal practice being the order of the day.

This afternoon's game will start at 2:30 o'clock and a large crowd is expected to attend, despite the fact that Notre Dame should have an easy task in whipping the lads from Terre Haute.

It will be the last chance that the fans will have of seeing the gold and blue in action before the Yale and South Dakota games, both of which will be played away from home. Practically all of this week, the practice sessions on Cartier field have been in secret, so the hungry fans have had to content themselves with waiting until today's game.

There was an unusually large crowd at the Alma game, despite the fact that it was an unimportant game and so early in the season and it is expected that today's crowd will be considerably larger.

Battling Levinsky outpointed Gunboat Smith in 10 rounds.

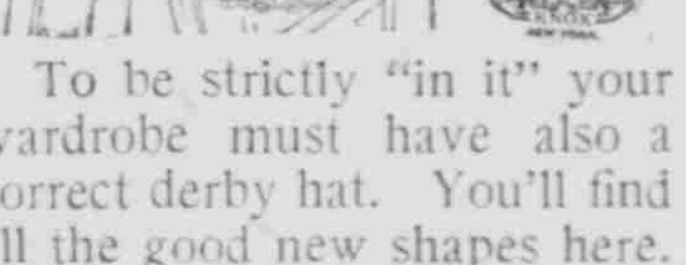
Harry Landy, the Brooklyn bantamweight, knocked out Tommy Stone of Buffalo in the second round.
