BOSTON BRAVES AGAIN WHIP ATHLETIC CREW IN THIRD CONTEST FOR WORLD TITLE

Most Critical Tilt of Series Attracts Thousands of New England Fans to Fenway Park Where Bush and Tyler Take Turns

BOSTON, Mass. (Fenway Park)—Oct. 12.—Boston fans saw their favorites defeat the Philadelphia Athletics this afternoon in the third contest of the series for the world title. The game was one of the most exciting thus far in the fray for the championship and the park was packed to the overflowing with a huge mob of wildly enthusiastic fans.

Today's Game Crisis.
Managers, players, experts and fans figured that today's game was the crisis of the series. Victory for the Braves meant a practical clinch of the championship while victory for the Athletics meant a return of the confidence that had been slowly oozing away before the Braves fell upon Chief Bender in the opening skirmish and took his scalp to adorn their wigwag.

The game today was played under ideal conditions. The weather was just enough cool to be comfortable. There was no hint of rain or even a cloud. The blue sky arched over the white concrete stands and green playing field like a great cap of new-made steel. Something of a breeze blew in from somewhere in the winterland.

A Bostonian, garbed as a quaker, made a big hit by parading around wearing a sign which read: "Fresh sausages made from Connie Mack's goat." He carried a big basket of frankfurters. By 1:20 p. m. the grand stands were full. The crowd had come. Nevertheless the fans kept arriving, filling empty places here and there. A large space in left in the circus seats was reserved for the "royal rosters."

CHAMBER GIVEN NEW PROMISES OF STRONG SUPPORT

With the pledges from J. D. Oliver and the Studebaker corporation of most hearty support and cooperation both in the membership campaign and the future activities of the organization, the Chamber of Commerce enlargement campaign began Monday morning and at noon 74 new memberships had been secured.

Mayor Keller was the first to sign when the campaign began. Being a past president of the chamber he suggested that all those belonging to the past presidents' club sign a double membership. He took out two.

DEMOCRATS ARE READY TO BEGIN MEETINGS

Democrats of St. Joseph county will go into action for the fall campaign this week, according to an announcement Monday by Rudolph Ackerman, democratic chairman, who gave out a list of meetings to be held in the various towns over the country during the next 10 days.

GERMANS BEGIN ADVANCE TOWARD CITY OF OSTEND

Victorious Army Invading Belgian Meets Stubborn Resistance in Pursuit of the Retreating Enemy, However.

QUIET IS RESTORED IN CAPTURED ANTWERP

City Has Not Suffered Extensive Damage in Spite of Most Terrific Bombardment in History of Warfare.

OSTEND, Oct. 12.—The German advance against Ostend has begun. The first move in the invaders' campaign was a desperate effort to cut off the Belgian army which fled westward from Antwerp when it was seen that the city was doomed.

The Germans threw a pontoon bridge across the Scheldt at Wetteren and sent a large force northward in hope of getting between this city and the Belgians.

However, in conducting that enterprise the Germans weakened their defense of Brussels and came in contact with a heavy force sent to relieve the Belgian troops. At last reports fighting was going on with the success on the side of the allies.

In their advance against Ghent the Germans got as far as Leochrisli, which is only about five miles from the eastern suburbs of Ghent.

Attacking Force Back.
The attacking force, under a hot fire from machine guns, and light artillery, were compelled to fall back about eight miles to Lokeren.

The occupation of Lokeren by the German forces was an important movement for the invaders for Lokeren is a point of strategic importance.

A detachment of uhlans had a brush with a squad of Belgians near the roads on which the city's residents were compelled to flee. But the Germans sent forward a heavier force with artillery and attacked Melle which caught on fire and was partially destroyed. The Belgians then retreated toward Ghent.

NORMAL CONDITIONS ARE RESTORED IN ANTWERP.
ROZENDAAAL, Holland, Oct. 12.—The last forts at Antwerp have yielded to the Germans, the fires there have been extinguished by German troops and normal conditions are being restored according to information received here today. Latest reports indicate that the city did not suffer terrible damage from the bombardment. The fires that resulted were largely confined to the suburbs of Berchem and the southeastern part of the city.

Gen. von Besseker, the German commander, is cooperating with Burgomaster Devos in restoring a condition of tranquility in the captured city. Couriers have been dispatched along the roads on which the city's residents fled and they are being urged to return and take up their usual occupations.

Long after the forts had been evacuated by the Belgians the Germans continued to rain shells upon the ruins in order to destroy any unexploded mines in the city.

Soldiers Are Exhausted.
When the outer forts were silenced the Belgians exhausted and benumbed, withdrew to the inner line. There was not a soldier that did not show some mark of the terrible experience to which they had been subjected. Many of them had their heads swathed in bandages. Their clothing was smeared with mud and not a few were stone deaf, their eardrums having been shattered by the terrific detonations of the mighty German shells bursting in the forts.

German Invaders Still Hold Vantage Points in Eastern and Western War Theaters

Eleventh Week of War Opens With Teutons Maintaining All Advantages Gained in France and Russia.

BERLIN, Oct. 12.—(By wireless via Sayville.)—The general staff reports that a very strong garrison defended Antwerp. At first it defended the city with great energy, but fled in full rout after an attack by a German infantry and marine division, it is stated. Among the garrison troops was one British marine brigade. The number of prisoners taken is not yet known. Many of the residents who fled to Holland have returned. The German commander at Antwerp has received the order pour la merite for his services. He issued a proclamation saying that nobody would be harmed unless hostile acts were committed, and private property would be spared, but he also issued this warning:

"Resistance will cause the destruction of your beautiful city." The Morgen Post states that during the bombardment of Antwerp, the Germans most carefully spared the churches and museums. The official German news agency gave out this information today.

Report Heavy Losses.
"Vienna reports heavy losses to the Russians at Przemyel. The siege of fortress has been given up. The Austrians defeated six Russian divisions near Lancut. They routed one cossack division east of Nymao. The Japanese have occupied the Shantung railroad, the Chinese state railway built by the Germans. China has made a protest.

"Italian papers, the Corriere Della Serria and the Scampa report revolting atrocities by French troops. "German cavalry on the evening of Saturday completely routed a French cavalry division west of Lille, and near Hazebruck (28 miles south southwest of Ostend.) They inflicted heavy losses on a French cavalry division.

"Up to the present the engagements in the front in the western theater of war have not led to decisive results. "Information is still lacking as to the booty taken at Antwerp, nor can the number of Belgian troops who crossed the Dutch frontier be fixed.

Repulse All Attacks.
"In the eastern theater the Germans repulsed in the north all attacks by the first and tenth Russian armies on Friday, and Saturday. Russian outflanking efforts via Schirwid (95 miles east of Koenigsberg have also been repulsed). The Russians lost 1,000 prisoners.

"In South Poland the advance guard of the German armies has reached the Vistula. Near Groje, south of Warsaw, the Germans captured 2,000 men of the seventh Siberian corps.

"The Russian official communiques about great Russian victories at Augustowa and Suwalki are inventions. The fact that no Russian communiques were published about the tremendous hostilities between Tannenberg and Insterburg, vouches for the unreliability of the Russian official information."

State Secretary Takes Own Life.
HARRY WOODS, prominent politician, defeated in recent primaries, commits suicide in moment of insanity.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Oct. 12.—The body of Secy of State Harry Woods was found in a room in the garage at his home here this morning shortly after 7 o'clock. He had been dead since early yesterday morning, when he shot himself in the head with a revolver.

Temporary insanity, resulting from a blow which he received in the head in Chicago several years ago is believed to be the cause.

Woods arose yesterday morning about 6:30 o'clock and went to his garage. He was not seen after that. Owing to his erratic habits his wife thought nothing of his absence.

This morning Mrs. Woods went to the garage to get a book she had left there. She found the door locked and the key missing. She immediately suspected something was wrong and called to Walter A. Townsend, a neighbor. He managed to get the door open.

Find Body on Floor.
Woods' body was lying on the floor of the room next to the alley. In his hand was tightly clutched the revolver with which the shooting was done at 32-calibre. The bullet took effect in his forehead just over and between his eyes.

ALLIES REPULSE GERMAN ATTACKS PARIS ANNOUNCES

Anglo-French Army Also Makes Progress on Right Bank of Aisne — Cavalry Engagements Near Lille Continue.

SECOND AERIAL RAID PUTS PARIS INTO PANIC

Bombs Dropped From Aeroplanes Fail to Explode—One Bears Note Threatening Capture of French Capital.

PARIS, Oct. 12.—Attacks made by the German troops on the French left wing between Lassigny and Roye have been repulsed, according to an official statement issued at 3:15 o'clock this afternoon. It states that the allies also have made some progress on the right bank of the Aisne. The cavalry engagements in the region about Lille continue.

The official statement follows: "1.—On our left wing, the cavalry engagements continue in the region of Labasse-Estaires-Haumont (all near Lille.) Between Arras and the Oise the enemy has attempted numerous attacks which have been repulsed, notably between Lassigny and Roye.

"2.—At the center we have made some progress on the plateau on the right bank of the Aisne before Soissons and to the east and southeast of Verdun.

"3.—Our right wing, in the Vosges, the enemy made a night attack to the north of St. Die, but was repulsed. "Flags Are Captured.

"The flags taken yesterday belonged to the 60th regiment of active Pomeranian infantry and to the 49th regiment of the 20th German army corps.

"The brigade of marine fusiliers was engaged night and day on Oct. 9, and Oct. 10 against the Germans. They repulsed the enemy inflicting upon them a severe loss of 200 killed, and 500 prisoners. The losses of the French were nine killed and 29 wounded.

"(This is the first time that marine forces have been mentioned in connection with the French operations.) In Belgium according to the latest information received concerning Antwerp, the Germans have only occupied the suburbs of the city. The 24 forts on the two banks of the Scheldt are resisting energetically.

"1.—The battle continues mercilessly on the frontier of East Prussia to the northwest of Lyck. The Germans, in full retreat, are destroying their bridges in southern Poland between Przemysl and San. Artillery battles are raging between the opposing columns stretched along the Vistula.

Aerial Raid on Paris.
A German aerial raid upon Paris, the second within 24 hours, was made today by a Taube aeroplane which swooped down upon the city from the northeast and dropped bombs heavily on the city.

The missiles failed to explode and were later found imbedded in the earth, two on the surface.

Verdun Next Target.
The next target for the monster Krupp and Austrian siege guns that demolished the forts around Antwerp, is expected to be the fortress at Verdun, which have stood in the way of the German advance along the Meuse valley in eastern France. The gigantic cannon which reduced the Antwerp forts are already on their way to France.

If, as believed, Verdun is their destination, it will be at least a week before the siege artillery could be ranged in position. The Germans have guns and ammunition have to be transported more than 225 miles across Belgium and western Germany. On account of the strength of the French forces along the Meuse and the nature of the country around Verdun, the Germans may not be able to get their heaviest siege guns in a position to shell the forts. At Antwerp, Liege and Namur the German troops were not opposed by heavy forces of men and the artillery in those works was not as heavy as that in the Verdun forts.

Expect Hard Blows.
It is expected that hard blows will be struck during the next few days in northeastern France and northern Belgium. The Germans will undoubtedly attempt to take Ostend, to which point King Albert's Belgian army is reported to have made its way in safety. A strong force of French and English troops is reported to be in the vicinity of Ostend and if the Germans throw an army against that city it will meet with stout resistance.

GERMANS SPARED ART TREASURES

Cathedral and Museums in Antwerp Not Fired Upon During the Bombardment—Cavalry Routs French Near Lille.

LONDON, Oct. 12.—The opening of the eleventh week of the war finds Germany more than holding all the advantages she has gained in both the western and eastern theaters of war. The Germans still hold the strong positions to which they retired along the Aisne and the capture of Antwerp has greatly strengthened their lines in both Belgium and France.

In the eastern theater of hostilities the Germans have penetrated Poland as far as the Vistula and, while the Russian government has laid claim to important victories in the Suwalki district when the history of the war is written it probably will be found that these successes did not mean so much as the Russian general staff has tried to make out. (An unprejudiced, calm survey of the situation in the entire east does not favor the German position.)

Nothing was said by the secretary of state to his family yesterday which indicated his intention. He had acted queerly for years and many people have believed that he was not altogether sane. However, he has never shown any moroseness and in outward appearance, at least, has always been cheerful.
