## BOSTON BRAVES AGAIN WHIP ATHLETIC CREW IN THIRD CONTEST FOR WORLD TITLE

Most Critical Tilt of Series Attracts Thousands of New England Fans to Fenway Park Where Bush and Tyler Take Turns

BOSTON, Mass. (Fenway Park)—Oct. 12.—Boston fans saw their favorites defeat the Philadelphia Athletics this afternoon in the third contest of the series for the world title. The game was one of the most exciting thus far in the fray for the championship and the park was packed to the overflowing with a huge mob of wildly enthusiastic fans.

Today's Game Crisis.

Managers, players, experts and fans figured that today's game was the crisis of the series. Victory for the Braves meant a practical clinch of the championship while victory for the Athletics meant a return of the confidence that had been slowly oozing away before the Braves fell upon Chet Bender in the opening skirmish and took his scalp to adorn their wigwam.

The game today was played under ideal conditions. The weather was just enough cool to be comfortable, with not a hint of rain or even a cloud. The blue sky arched over the white concrete stands and green playing field like a great cap of new-made steel. Something of a breeze blew in from somewhere in the winterland.

A Bostonian, garbed as a quaker, made a big hit by parading around wearing a sign which read:

"Fresh sausages made from Connie Mack's goat." He carried a big basket of frankfurters. By 1:20 p.m. the grand stands were full. The crowd had come. Nevertheless the fans kept arriving, filling the empty places here and there. A large space in left in the circus seats was reserved for the "royal roosters."

## CHAMBER GIVEN NEW PROMISES OF STRONG SUPPORT

With the pledges from J. D. Oliver and the Studebaker corporation of most hearty support and cooperation both in the membership campaign and the future activities of the organization, the Chamber of Commerce enlargement campaign began Monday morning and at noon 74 new memberships had been secured.

Both the Oliver and the Studebaker corporations will make large pledges taking a number of memberships which will no doubt be assigned to the various heads of the departments in each concern. A special committee conferred with Frederick S. Fish of the Studebaker corporation and with Mr. Oliver.

About 50 business men gathered at the chamber at 9:30 in the morning and with their 10 captains began the solicitation for new members. Only half of the teams were ready to start in the morning, the rest getting under-way during the afternoon.

"This is South Bend's opportunity," Rev. Charles A. Lippincott declared in an address at the luncheon at the Oliver Hotel Monday when the reports of the committees were made. "South Bend needs big men. We must act with them in a unity to make our city forever world famed."

**Mayor First to Sign.**

Mayor Keller was the first to sign when the campaign began. Being a past president of the chamber he suggested that all those belonging to the past presidents' club sign a double membership. He took out two, there are eight past presidents.

The total was 74. Teams of S. G. Chard and L. W. Jackson as well as Rollo Page began work in the afternoon. Out of this number it is estimated that more than 50 per cent were new members.

## GERMANS BEGIN ADVANCE TOWARD CITY OF OSTEND

Victorious Army Invading Belgian Meets Stubborn Resistance in Pursuit of the Retreating Enemy, However.

### QUIET IS RESTORED IN CAPTURED ANTWERP

City Has Not Suffered Extensive Damage in Spite of Most Terrific Bombardment in History of Warfare.

OSTEND, Oct. 12.—The German advance against Ostend has begun. The first move in the invaders' campaign was a desperate effort to cut off the Belgian army which fled westward from Antwerp when it was seen that the city was doomed.

The Germans threw a pontoon bridge across the Scheldt at Wetteren and sent a large force northward in hope of getting between this city and the Belgians.

However, in conducting that enterprise the Germans weakened their defense of Brussels and came in contact with a strong force sent to relieve the Belgian troops. The last reports fighting was going on with the success of the allies.

In their advance against Ghent the Germans got as far as Leopoldville, which is only about five miles from the eastern suburbs of Ghent.
